P.E.I. Presbytery's Committee on Sabbath Schools, of which Rev. R. G. Strathie is the active convener, has issued a circular announcing that it is the intention of the Committee to hold a number of conferences throughout the Province, during the last week of June and first of July, in the interests of Sabbath School work. It is proposed to have these conferences so distributed as to be within ten miles of every Presbyterian School on the Island—an excellent plan.

Following the example of Charlottetown and St. John in recent years Sydney proposes to hold a Firemen's tournament this year. At a meeting of the members of the Volunteer fire brigade held in that city on Tuesday evening, the matter of a Cape Breton firemen's tournament was discussed. The proposal is to take in the colliery towns, North Sydney and Sydney Mines and to hold the meet some time in July. The proposal met with general favor and a committee was appointed to take the matter under advisement and report at a meeting to be held in the near future. The election of officers was deferred until next meeting.

The members of the general committee of the order of railway telegraphers have returned from Ottawa, where they have been for several days in connection with the application for increase of wages and schedule changes, having finally arrived at a satisfactory settlement of these matters. Jean, River du Loup—were accompanied by A. Dixon, train despatcher of Lewis. The members of the committee will, this week, have a conference with D. Pottinger, general manager, in connection with schedule matters. Speaking of the trip to Ottawa, Mr. Charters said, the committee had met Mr. Butler, the deputy minister of railways, regarding the changes asked for in the rules and an increase of pay to I.C.R. telegraphers. A satisfactory agreement was reached on all matters previously unsettled. The amount granted towards the increase of salaries will amount to nearly ten per cent. The increase will also to a certain extent apply to train despatchers and their operators.
