The death took place at Lennox Island on Thursday the 3rd inst, of Joseph Francis aged 84, a well known Micmac and an ex-chief who for eighteen years ruled over his people in a manner that earned for him the best opinion of everyone with whom he was brought into contact. He was a man of estimable character and a prominent official of the church on the reservation. His death was deeply regretted by all his fellow residents as he was a man reputed to be without an enemy. He will not be forgotten for years to come. He leaves to mourn three sons and a daughter who are at present living on Lennox Island.

In the city market, yesterday, produce was moving slowly. The hay market was fair, eight fifty a ton being asked for pressed and forty five to fifty a cwt for loose. The oat market was poor there being only a small quantity moving, white oats were fifty-five to fifty-eight and black fifty-eight to sixty. Butter was sold at twenty-one to twenty-two cents a lb and eggs at sixteen to seventeen cents a doz. Straw which we up to its usual standard, sold at five dollars a ton for pressed and thirty to thirty-five a cwt. for loose. Dealers report lots of potatoes on the market, the price ranging from thirty-five to forty cents a bus. The pork market is still brisk and is likely to be for some time, the price ranging from eight to the poorer quality to eight and seven eighths for the best.
