ACCIDENT IN MACHINE SHOP

—What might have been a very serious accident took place at eleven o'clock Monday morning in the machine shop of Messrs. Bruce Stewart & Co., Ltd. Ivan Nicholson, son of the late Wm. Nicholson of this city was carrying a ladder from one part of the shop to the other, when he tripped and fell over some finished bronze propellers, which were stacked in a pile on the floor. He put out his hand to break the force of his fall, and brought it down on the sharp edge of one of the propellers, cutting the hand and wrist, and severing the radial artery. The wound bled so profusely that but for the first aid, promptly and efficiently rendered by Mr. Bruce Stewart, the injured man might have bled to death. A physician promptly arrived on the scene and removed Mr. Nicholson to the P. E. Island Hospital where his wound was washed and sutured. He was then taken to his home, where it is reported, he is now resting comfortably. It is hoped that he will be able to return to his duties in the course of two or three weeks.

The funeral on Saturday 19th, inst. was largely attended by neighbors and friends, burial taking place in St. James Cemetery, Summerfield. A High Mass of Requiem was celebrated by the kind pastor, Rev. F. McDonald, with Rev. P. L. McMahon, nephew of the deceased, assisting in the Sanctuary and at the grave. The pall bearers were P. J.
