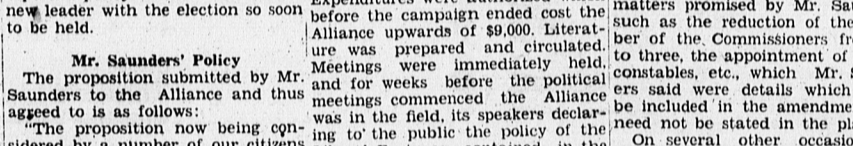

No Release Given

It was never understood by the Alliance Committee, nor was it stated by the Premier at that time, that the brief statement as published in his platform was intended to take the place of the more detailed statement previously given to the Alliance. Indeed, there is no conflict between the two statements except as to the number of Prohibition prosecutors promised, which Mr. Saunders reduced from twelve to nine, stating that if more were needed more would be appointed. That the brief statement published in Mr. Saunders' platform was never intended as a full or detailed statement of what he promised is evident from the fact that when the short statement was prepared on the 14th April there were other matters promised by Mr. Saunders such as the reduction of the number of the Commissioners from six to three, the appointment of special constables, etc., which Mr. Saunders said were details which would be included in the amendment, but need not be stated in the platform. On several other occasions Mr. Saunders promised representatives of the Alliance that if his party were elected to office they would appoint as Commissioners and Inspectors persons who would be approved by the Alliance. After the election requested by the Alliance to furnish the names of persons whom the Alliance desired to have appointed as Commissioners. This was done. Three only of these were appointed. The remaining three who were appointed were selected without consultation with the Alliance and without any request for its approval.

Reduction to 25 Scripts Promised

The number of public meetings held by the Alliance during the campaign exceeded 350. Of these meetings 88 were addressed by the Alliance's General Secretary and 59 by the Alliance's Solicitor, of which meetings no more than half a dozen were reported in the press. Practically all of the meetings addressed by Mr. MacLeod and Mr. Bentley reference was made to the promise of the Liberal Party to reduce the number of certificates to twenty-five per month for each doctor as a maximum number, and the other promises referred to above including that regarding the appointment of the Commission and Inspectors. The Alliance speakers also pledged themselves to do what was stated by them were not kept by the Liberal Party after being elected to the Temperance Alliance would see to it that the facts would be made known.

How it Worked

In pursuance of this arrangement which was understood by the Alliance representatives as an express promise binding upon the Liberal Party, the Temperance Alliance organized for the contest, and proceeded to perform its part in carrying out the compact. An office was opened and office help engaged. Expenditures were authorized which the campaign ended cost the Alliance upwards of \$9,000. Literature was prepared and circulated. Meetings were immediately held, and for weeks before the political meetings commenced the Alliance was in the field, its speakers declaring to the public the policy of the Liberal Party as contained in the foregoing agreement or statement. At these meetings many of the people addressed asked for some public declaration from the leader of the Liberal Party himself as to his policy. This demand was insistent, and was made known to Mr. Saunders by the Alliance speakers on several occasions, and it was pointed out to him that votes were being lost to him by his delay in making public the position of his party regarding the Prohibition Act.

Mr. Saunders' Policy

The proposition submitted by Mr. Saunders to the Alliance and thus agreed to is as follows: "The proposition now being considered by a number of our citizens is as follows: 1. That we amend the Prohibition Act along such lines as the Temperance Alliance deems advisable, such for instance as appointment three new Magistrates,—one for each County—giving them exclusive jurisdiction under the Prohibition Act, and appointing men who are at least sympathetic with the enforcement of the Act. 2. To limit doctors' certificates to at least twenty-five per month. Any certificates over and above that issued by any doctor in any single month, will be regarded as prima facie violation of the Act. It will then be up to such doctor issuing more than the number mentioned to show that he did so for medical purposes only, that is to say, the burden of proof will be on the doctor. 3. That every doctor be compelled to take the pulse of the patient, his temperature and his respiration, and keep a record of the same in his office, and mark same on any certificate issued to the patient. 4. A doctor shall be permitted to charge only a nominal fee of twenty-five cents for issuing a certificate. 5. The appointment of at least twelve Prohibition inspectors for the Province, and other reasonable amendments as the Alliance deems advisable. 6. That if the Liberal Party is elected at the next ensuing election they should call a special session of the Legislature for the purpose of having the Prohibition Act amended accordingly. 7. That after giving effect to the operation of this Act for a period of
