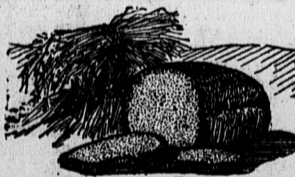

GOES WEST—Mr. Stephen Pond, son of the esteemed editor of The Pioneer, Summerside left on Saturday last for Morsden, Saskatchewan, where he intends to make his home. Stephen, though only fifteen years of age, is ambitious to make his way in the world and will no doubt succeed. He is one of the pupils of the Summerside High School whose name appears in this issue in the successful list of matriculants for Prince of Wales College passing his exams with the creditable showing of 550 marks.

COUNTY COURT—The August term of the County Court was held at Alberton on Tuesday. Owing to the death of Mr. W. D. White, Clerk of the Court, and no new appointment having been made, the docket was made up of adjourned cases from the March Court which occupied the attention of Judge MacQuarrie practically all day. In an absent debtor suit an application was made for a rehearing of the defendant having returned to the Province. This was granted and the case tried by the judge, who reduced the amount of the former judgment by \$35.61, which was offered repaid to the defendant, Wilfred Tanton, for plaintiff, Heath Strong, for defendant. A case in which a man from Lot Eleven sued a party from Mis- couche ended in judgment for the latter for \$7.50, it being a case of contra account. Wilfred Tanton, plaintiff and C. D. McCallum for defendant. A number of uncontested debt cases were also disposed of.

DEATH OF "LILA VANE" SISTER OF W. S. HARKINS

The many friends throughout the Maritime Provinces of W. S. Harkins will regret to learn of the death of his sister, which took place after an extended illness on Saturday last at the residence of Mr. Harkins at East Orange, N. J. The funeral services were held on Monday in "The Little Church Around the Corner," and interment took place in the family plot in Woodlawn cemetery, New York.

The deceased lady, known in the theatre as Lila Vane, was one of the handsomest women on the American stage. Possessed of a magnetic personality and exceptional dramatic ability, she was for years one of the best known and most popular leading women in the theatrical profession. She was the choice of the late Bartley Campbell, the well-known playwright, for the leading roles in all his plays. The late Charles Frohman chose her for leads in many of his productions, notably "All the Comforts of Home," "Men and Women," and "Shenandoah," in which she and the late Henry Miller were featured. George C. Tyler selected her to succeed Viola Allen as Glory Quail in "The Christian." For three years she was leading lady for the late Nat C. Goodwin. Some years ago she appeared in Montreal as leading lady in one of Mr. Harkins' companies, playing in many of the English and American successes of the day. Her death leaves Mr. Harkins the sole survivor of the family.

Gehrig Now Leads By Two Homers

NEW YORK, Aug. 5.—Babe Ruth closed up a bit of the gap that separates him from his team-mate, Lou Gehrig, in the home run derby when the bumblebeed clouted his 34th circuit smash of the season in the 8th inning of the Detroit game today. Gehrig now leads by two homers. Smith tied pitching for Detroit.

Caledonia Summer Bible School

The second term of the Caledonia Summer Bible School outside the school held during the summer of 1926. 83 pupils were enrolled in the school this year and there was an average daily attendance of 30. This school was held from 10 to 11:30 A. M. every day for ten days, July 18-29. Many of the children and young people came from a distance of three miles to the church and never missed a day. The Daily Vacation Bible Schools spend much time with basket weaving, handwork, and so on to keep up the interest. But this is strictly an all-Bible school. This school followed the system of work mapped out by Dr. A. L. Latham of Chester, Pennsylvania. Dr. Latham held a similar school in his Church, Chester Presbyterian Church in 1926, with over 600 pupils enrolled for the twelfth consecutive year. The enthusiasm of the pupils in the Caledonia School is evidence that such secondary things as basket-weaving and handwork are not necessary to interest the children in the study of the Bible.

The curriculum of courses in the school are as follows:—

- Assigned portions of Scripture.
- The Bible the Christian's Sacred Book.
- The Life of Jesus.
- A history course—Adam to Saul, and Saul to Christ.
- The Primary & Shorter Catechism.
- The Apostle Paul.
- The Twelve Apostles.
- This is all memory work.

During the two weeks time, the children learned an average of 53 verses of Scripture, 45 questions in The Bible the Christian's Sacred Book, 47 questions in the Shorter Catechism, 55 questions in the Life of Jesus, 53 questions in the book 'Adam to Saul'. The school was graded into six classes according to the public school grading, putting two grades in one class. The teachers were Misses Christine Bruce, Margaret MacLean, Catherine Bruce, Murlina Munn, Belle Bruce and Mr. Charles Walker. Mr. McDowell, pastor of Caledonia Presbyterian church was the superintendent of the school. It was finally necessary to secure ten teachers just to hear the children recite what they had learned. Misses Margaret Stewart, Florence Stewart, May MacGowan and Mr. John MacGowan also assisted with the teaching.

On Sunday morning, July 31, the closing exercises of the school were held in the Church. Every seat was occupied by those interested in the school. It was indeed an inspiration to see the 80 children march into the church singing 'Wonderful Words of Life' and to hear them recite together and individually 150 verses of Scripture and other important information of the Bible, all from memory, without forgetting a word. They also sang the hymns that they had learned during the term of school. The hour and half passed all too quickly for the interested audience.

On Monday the school went on a picnic to Murray River, where a very happy time was enjoyed together. At sunset the pupils gathered quietly on the hillside, overlooking the river, and sang together the hymns they had learned to love, and repeated together the Scriptures that had become treasure to them. Then they formed the Friendship circle and praised God for the Tie that had bound their hearts together in Christian love by singing, "Blest Be the Tie that Binds". We will be glad to assist others in starting such a school.
