At the Crystal Rink Summerside last night, the Windsor team champions of Nova Scotia defeated the Crystals by a score of 5-2 in a fast, clean, exciting game.

The second game was between the Crystal Sisters and the Wonder Club, the latter getting a close decision over the sisters by a score of 1-0.

The Sisters team was considerably weaker by the absence of Miss Phemie Gallant who left Tuesday morning for New York.

The Crystal-Windsor game started at 9:15 and the Summerside hockey fans were treated to the fastest and most exciting game seen played in Summerside for a long time. After fourteen minutes of very fast play by both teams, Houlton of the home team handed the first count of the game, this was followed two minutes later by E. Mosher of the visitors team, the period ending 1-1 with the teams playing even hockey.

The second period got away at 9:50 and after eighteen minutes of the hardest and fastest playing seen in Summerside in years, McDonald of the visitors scored from centre ice and the period ending 2-1 in favor of Windsor.

The third period started at 10:44 and two minutes later McDonald found the net and one minute later Rogers of the home team on an end to end rush notched in the second

and last count for the home team.

From the face-off both teams went into the game each eager for a scoring and six minutes from the start, McDonald again scored for Windsor, and repeated in two minutes on an end to end rush. The game ending 5-2 in favor of the Nova Scotia champions.
