Let everybody young and old turn out and enjoy a good game and at the same time help along a worthy cause. The prices have purposely been put low so that every body can go.

MAJOR STEWART, who last night commanded the Boy's Highland Brigade in the procession, mentioned to THE GUARDIAN that the incident recalled his boyhood's days in Georgetown when he was a member of the Boy's Brigade in that town and 45 years ago, in the autumn of 1855 was in a procession there to celebrate the fall of Sebastopol. That city was captured by the allied British and French armies Sept. 11, 1855, but the news did not reach this country for some weeks later. There were celebrations, processions and bonfires in both Charlottetown and Georgetown at that time.

A correspondent desires THE GUARDIAN to explain how it is that though the present year 1900 is divisible by the number 4, it is not a leap year, and February has only 28 days. The explanation begins with the fact that the ordinary year of 365 days is a little short of the true solar year. The time during which the earth makes a complete revolution around the sun is 365 days, 5 hours, 48 minutes and 46 seconds. It is clear that these hours, minutes and seconds are so much time left over, or carried forward. To bring matters as nearly right as may be one day is added to the calendar every fourth year, and is added to the month of February in each year. But there is not 24 hours "overtime" in the four years—only in fact, 23 hours, 15 minutes and four seconds. So that if in every fourth year a full day were added the year would not correspond with the time of the earth's revolution around the sun. To correct this error, once in the century the fourth year is not made a leap year. Hence it always happens that in the last four years of any century there can be no 29th day of February.

THE cannon that was fired from the roof of Dodd & Rogers' building last night was made in the year 1797 and was captured from the Spanish. The date and the Spanish coat of arms are plainly visible on the gun. And it must not be forgotten that the gun was fired yesterday by John Gillis.

YESTERDAY news of victory was most enthusiastically celebrated at the Misses Macmillan's, Prince St., at the noon meal. The dining table was most appropriately decorated and the air of true patriotism pervaded the entire house. Toasts were most enthusiastically and joyously drunk. Rev. D. B. McLeod referred appropriately to the rejoicing in common to-day by people of all nationalities in the British Empire and especially in Charlottetown. Principal Oxenham, a true Britisher, excelled himself, in his patriotic speech which brought forth repeated cheers and continued admiration from all present. Everybody was enthused with the true British spirit displayed by Mr. Oxenham on this very joyous occasion.

At the Prohibition Convention at Moncton last week the Maritime Prohibition Association was organized with the following Officers; Rev. E. Crowell, Yarmouth, president; Rev. A. B. Fletcher, Truro, vice-president; W. L. McFarlane, Fredericton, vice-president for New Brunswick. L. U. Fowler, vice-president for P. E. Island; W. T. L. Reid, Fredericton, secretary; J. A. Simpson, Amherst, treasurer. A resolution was passed urging prohibitionists to work for and secure the election of avowed prohibitionists from which ever party they could secure them. A resolution was passed memorializing the government to enact a prohibitory law. The convention decided to engage a paid temperance organizer for the three provinces, to go to work at once.—Messenger and Visitor.

The route of the procession was, starting from the City Hall, down Queen street to Water Street, thence along Water to Weymouth Street, thence to Euston Street, thence to Prince, along Prince to Grafton, along Grafton to Pownall, along Pownall to Water Street thence to Great George Street, up that street to Richmond, along Richmond to Queen and thence to Market Square.

When returned to the Square cheers were given for the Queen, Lord Roberts, General Buller and the Canadian soldiers. The band played patriotic airs after which the different societies were then dismissed. In the meantime a big bonfire had been lighted on the north side of the Market Building around which the patriotic crowd remained cheering and singing till a late hour.

THE GUARDIAN is informed that by some oversight the committee whose duty it was to have notified the Citizen's Band to turn out last night failed to do so, and hence the Chief of the fire department was not to blame for the Band not taking the place assigned to it in the program.

THE Maritime Merchant says:—One arrival last week from Georgetown is the only event worth reporting as far as this trade is concerned. Many of the island ports have been open all winter, which has made it easy for vessels to get out and in. Notwithstanding that few have come thither, probably because there were not many left when winter closed in that desired to engage in the trade. Business has been practically dead for some months. During the past fortnight a few potatoes have been selling ex-vessel at the wharves but the average would not probably exceed a few bushels a day. Trade will not open out until March, when a brisk business will probably be carried on and be continued during April. Oats are firmer for small quantities, the prices being 37 to 38c. for large and 39 to 40c. for small quantities. Potatoes remain at 30c. and turnips at 30 to 35c. per bushel.
