

# Canadians Capture N. B.-P. E. I. Title



## Beat New Brunswick Champions By 4-2 Count In Sudden Death Game

make a strong contribution to the preservation of world peace. He read into the speech a diametrically opposite meaning to that received by other members.

It is inevitable, in looking at the proposals made by the Prime Minister in regard to San Francisco, that their appeal in the coming Federal election should be considered. Mr. King may have made an attempt to please both sides of opinion in his original speech—those who want to play a strong part in world security and those who distrust the surrender of any national initiative to a world security organization. It has been apparent, from all sides of the House, that the former group are in great strength than the latter and that the majority of Canadians with them in taking part in world security plans.

Would it not be the logical thing for Mr. King to have one of his cabinet so interpret his original speech that the support of the strong internationalists would be secured? And if, at the same time, Mr. King's speech could be interpreted to the moderate isolationists as supporting them, would not the Prime Minister be in the happy position of being able to appeal to both sides, although diametrically opposed, with the same words?

H. Hence. (PC-Saskatoon, Sask.) added another brick to the structure his party has been raising against the Prime Minister's proposals, by emphasizing that Canada should now be grown up and it was time she acted in whole-hearted concert with other nations in the preservation of peace. Now was the time to acknowledge her responsibility, and to make the necessary commitments towards world security.

Editor's Note: Robert C. Wilson, 26-year-old Associated Press War Correspondent, volunteered for the dangerous job of covering the Allied airborne operation across the Rhine at first hand. He was shot down, but Wilson has returned safely to Paris with this spilling story.

PARIS, March 26 (AP)—Twenty nine parachute troops were shot down in the C-47 troop carrier on which I was a passenger at 10:16 A.M. Saturday.

Just three minutes after we crossed the smoke-masked Rhine at an altitude of 600 feet.

Suddenly the huge plane shuddered. A wing sprang fire. The plane was a sickening thud as German "ak" ripped into the ship. A few minutes later I was crawling out from the terrific jar I got when I landed to recall much detail. Moreover, I was too occupied with getting out of the paths of warms of British soldiers that were swooping into the field.
