STOKE-NEWINGTON, Eng., November 25—"I hope, I trust and I believe that Ramsay MacDonald will take no part in the Imperial Conference which will be held at Ottawa in 1931," declared Lord Brentford, the erstwhile Sir William Joynton-Hicks, who is still known popularly in political circles as "Jik," when he addressed a Conservative meeting here Saturday.

"If MacDonald participates the conference will fall again," said the former Home Secretary. "If he, or Snowden or Graham go to Ottawa the conference will be doomed. They are against subsidies and all forms of preference which we, the Conservatives, would be prepared to discuss with our daughter nations."

guilty." Mrs. Delaney will be arraigned later.
The trial of the Yeo brothers, the first criminal case to be heard will commence this morning. It is expected that this case will occupy the balance of the week, as there is a large number of witnesses.

Grand Jury Charge

Following were the Grand Jurors: D. B. McDonald, foreman, North Endouque; John Haw, O'Leary; Peter J. Cameron, Southwest Lot 16; Joseph Simmons, New Annon; Bertram Tyle, St. Eleanor's; Joseph B. McInyre, Richmond; William P. Callaghan, St. Louis; Austin Ramsay, Conway; Wm. N. Heustis, Summerside; Villero Carr, Miscouche.
Mr. Justice Saunders expressed his pleasure in having the privilege of addressing a Grand Jury for the first time. He pointed out the importance and responsibility of the duties which rested upon them as representatives of the County and their duty to the public. It was not always possible, he said, for the Attorney General to know what was going on in the matter of crime and it was their privilege at this time to bring to the notice of the Court any crime or any matter within their knowledge which they considered should be brought to light to safeguard the interests of their fellow citizens.

The Court referred to the recent appalling accidents at level crossings and suggested that this was an opportunity for the Grand Jury to make any suggestions with a view to eliminating this danger.

In presenting the indictments to the Jury the Judge stressed the importance of the duty which was laid upon them in bringing in a true bill if they considered the facts warranted it.

In regard to the fox stealing case he reminded them that fox stealing has been going on and not many of the criminals have been brought to justice.

In commenting on the Sheriff's report the Judge pointed out that there were now 34 prisoners in the Prince County jail; more than there have been for some time. Twenty one were bootleggers, which showed that a good deal of liquor was being sold illegally in the county. One is in jail for vagrancy, one for drunkenness seven for stealing and four for other crimes. This was not a very good record for Prince County His Lordship said regretfully. The law officials were not in the happy position of being able to present the presiding judge with a pair of white gloves at this term.

"To the Hon. Albert C. Saunders. May it please your Lordship, we the Grand Jury assembled congratulate you upon your elevation to the Supreme Court bench of your native Province. It is a pleasure for the Grand Jury to have you preside in your home town and county. The high and honorable position you now occupy did not come without work or merit. We have followed your career in civil and political life for some time. We can assure you the gift of office comes to those who do the most strenuous work for King and Country. We trust kind providence will be your protector. May you have health and strength to fulfill your judicial
