N. S. Coal Production

HALIFAX, Sept. 18 (CP) — Nova Scotia's coal production for the first six months of 1947 fell off 82 per cent from the figures for the same period last year, the Department of Industry reported tonight. Major factor in the slump was said to be the four-month general strike.

Only 1,076,473 tons were produced in the first six months compared with 2,840,752 for the first half of 1946.

Imports of coal for the six-month period almost doubled the tonnage for the same period in 1946.

Soft coal totalling 121,432 tons was imported compared with 66,465 last year. In June 18,552 tons of soft coal were imported compared with 84 tons in the same period of 1946.

In Memoriam

MRS. ROSENA BUOTE

A sad gloom was cast over North Rustico, and vicinity on Sept. 18, 1947, when it became known that Miss Rosena Buote aged 20 years, beloved daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Moses Buote, had passed on to her eternal reward at the Charlottetown Hospital, after a brief illness of only two weeks. Before being taken to the hospital, she was visited at her home, by Rev. J. Clarence Pitre, Pastor at South Rustico who administered to her the last rites of the Holy Catholic Church, of which she was a faithful member, and a true Child of Mary.

Miss Buote was formerly employed by the firm of Peters & Gallant where she will be greatly missed, as her pleasing personality had won for her a host of friends, for she was truly a friend to all who knew her.

At the Hospital, all that medical skill could do for her was done, but to no avail. Her father remained at her bedside until the end.

The remains were taken from the Hennessey Undertaking Parlors, to her home, where a host of friends and neighbors came to pay their last tribute.

She leaves to cherish the fond memory, of a dear daughter and loving sister besides a sorrowing father and mother, four brothers, Elmer at the Provincial Sanatorium, Edward, Arthur and Clarence, as she was in possession of all her faculties until the end, but her physical condition becoming much more serious, on the arrival of her son and his wife, she was removed to the hospital where she received every care and attention.

During World War I her son Ray was a prisoner overseas for over three years, and the anxiety over his fate, followed by the sudden death of her husband cast a shadow over her life, but her optimistic temperament, and high Christian character enabled her to endure, while her genial personality endeared her to all with whom she came in contact.

The funeral was held from New London Presbyterian Church, where in the absence of the pastor, the funeral service was conducted by Rev. W. I. Green, a life long friend of the family, and a large choir from the Presbyterian and United Churches sang the appropriate hymns. All the way my Saviour leads me, and Abide With Me, while a duet, The Old Rugged Cross, was feelingly rendered by Andrew World and Ernest Dunning of Long River.

The pall bearers were John McLeod, Angus Green, H. P. Found, Cameron McGregor, Stirling McKay and J. L. Lockhart.

Interment of the remains is left to mourn the loss of a kind and loving mother, Dan in New York; John in Manitoba; Ray in Ottawa; and Fenton M. Wollaston, Mass., who accompanied by his son drove home in time for the funeral.

Blessed are they who die in the Lord, for their works do follow them.

In Memoriam

JOHN ARCHIBALD MURRAY

Clyde River lost an old and respected citizen on June 5th in the person of John Archibald Murray, a life-long resident in the district. Born October 14, 1864, he was in his 83rd year. His death, though not entirely unexpected considering his advanced years, came as a severe blow to his family, and to a wide circle of friends as well.

Mr. Murray was a quiet, unassuming man, yet gifted above many with sterling qualities of heart and hand, and considerable business acumen. He was one who always wielded much influence in the community. He was an entertaining conversationalist, able to draw from the rich storehouse of memory, much that was extremely interesting from earlier years, which made him a favorite with young and older. He was a good and enterprising farmer, the kindest of neighbors, a staunch friend, a loving and considerate husband and father. He was charitable in word and deed, and in the community he was always ready and willing to assist in every worthy undertaking.

In the school, which was ever his interest, he was the capable and respected Secretary of Trustees for many years. In the home, in which like his father before him he had been born and lived and died, he always dispensed hospitality with a generous hand. Here it is that he will be sorely missed, especially when children and grand and great-grandchildren gather beneath the old roof.

It was given to him, however, to come to the end of his earthly journey quietly away in his rest to the land "far ben" to join those of his loved ones already there. He was a son of John A. Murray, Clyde River and his wife Isabelle Murray of New Brunswick. His wife, Mary Ann MacNeil, a daughter of the late Donald MacNeil, Clyde River, predeceased him by many years, as did also several of his sons and daughters. One of the former, Hector, when only a lad, gave his life in "Flanders Fields" in World War I.

Of a family of twelve children, five remain to mourn the loss of a father who was always most kind and considerate to his children. Mrs. Carrie Campbell, Dorchester, Mass.; Mrs. Seymour Scott, Cornwall; Mrs. Hugh Walker, Charlottetown; John A. on the homestead and Miss Lydia also of Dorchester, and Mrs. Mary Ann MacNeil, Cornwall. The funeral was largely attended and many relatives and friends came from far and near to pay last respects. The service was conducted by Rev. Athol Roberts, assisted by Rev. Skinner, Cornwall. Favorite hymns of the departed were sung: "Rock of Ages", "When the Roll is Called up Yonder" and "In the Sweet Bye and Bye." Mrs. Roberts, who sang in sweet and sympathetic voice as a solo "The Old Rugged Cross."

The pall-bearers were Fulford A. Darrach, Addison Livingstone, James Livingstone, Harold Scott, Frank Gillespie and Everett Murray. The funeral arrangements were under the direction of The Cutcliffe Funeral Home and interment was in the family plot in the Baptist cemetery, Clyde River.
