IN MEMORIAM.

Another link has been broken in the chain binding the past to the present in the removal by death of Jane, daughter of the late Donald McDonald of New Perth, and beloved wife of the late Duncan McCallum of Lot 48, at the advanced age of 94 years. At an early age she came to the Island with her parents from Scotland and settled at New Perth. She lived to see the dense forest give way to the stately pioneers and few could give a more intelligent and interesting account of the many hardships and privations of the early settlers. Her memory was quite good and she retained all her faculties up till a short time before she died. She always took an interest in the current events of the day and could converse intelligently on the doings of the present as well as of the past. She was the second child of a family of ten, remarkable for their sturdiness physically and morally, all of whom have preceded her to the great beyond except one sister Mrs. Alexander Robertson of Brudenell. At an early age the deceased made a profession of religion and identified herself with the Christian Church of which she was to the last a consistent and respected member. With a large family connection and acquaintance her home was always open to the traveller and wayfarer and the kindness and hospitality for which the early pioneers were noted was developed in her to a remarkable degree.
