FINANCIAL NEWS BRIEFS

(Received over Pitfield and Co's Private Wire)

NEW YORK, Nov. 5—All the leading newspapers are carrying stories to the effect that the treasury department is ready to make limited concessions to business in the matter of undistributed profits tax. Apparently the sentiment of the tax sub-committee of the House ways and means committee is strongly in favor of a revision of the undistributed profits tax. Another item of interest today is the report that Hitler will mediate the far east situation and it is reported that both sides have accepted Hitler as a mediator. American stocks in London are about the same as last year's New York close. The action was rather favorable yesterday and we look for a rally today.

NEW YORK, Nov. 5—Dun and Bradstreet's say of U. S. Trade—Hesitant improvement at the close of October gave way to a steady upturn at most of the leading centers of distribution with the increase in sales for the week ranging from 2 to 6 per cent. In nearly all districts, however, more of the advantage over last year's totals was lost which left the estimated volume of retail distribution 4 to 15 per cent over that recorded for the corresponding 1936 volume while the estimated wholesale volume was unchanged for the week. The gain over that of a year ago was reduced 6 to 15 per cent.

NEW YORK, Nov. 5—Cities Service Co. and subs nine months ended Sept. 30 net income \$5,283,528 after reserve for possible undistributed profits surtax and reserve of \$3,500,000 for contingencies against net income \$3,939,202 in the first nine months 1936.

NEW YORK, Nov. 5—Efforts of railroads to secure I. C. G. approval of rate increases estimated to yield upward of \$450,000,000 annually will have backing of rail labor, competing forms of transportation and some regional trucking associations are prepared to seek approval of 15 per cent increase.

MONTREAL, Nov. 5—President Cardenas of Mexico yesterday decreed nationalization of 350,000 acres of oil lands under lease to Std. Oil of Calif. Overrules Mexican Supreme Court decision.

U. S. Tax on Surplus—Discus-sion of undistributed corporation income tax to be item number one on committee list at coming Congress session.

Montreal Light Heat and Power—Power production for both October and for the ten months excluding secondary and export power up nearly 9 per cent over like 1936 period. Gas down 3 per cent for October and 3 1-2 per cent for the ten months over a year ago.

Bank Clearings—33 major Can-adian cities show aggregate drop 18 per cent in last week from like 1936 period. Montreal down 27 per cent, Toronto dropped about 16 per cent and Winnipeg 23 per cent.

Hiram Walker—Declares quar-terly dividend of \$1 a share on common payable December 15.

American Smelting—Cuts price of copper 1-4 cent a pound to 11 1-2 cents.

Newfoundland Sulphite Mill—Newfoundland Government negotiating with Bowater-Lloyds Company of England for construction of \$6,000,000 sulphite pulp mill.

Coal Production—Total for Sept. 1,415,219 against 1,448,051 tons in Sept. 1936.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5—There is no apparent disposition here to change the official American gold price of \$35 an ounce, a check of official opinion showed no sentiment in favor of raising price. Some officials laughed outright at the possibility while others admitting that rumors about the price were bound to start denied that there was any possibility of any change at this time.

MINING

TORONTO, Nov. 5—(CP)—A stronger dollar price for gold bars in the London market accompanied by heavy buying of the gold shares in London and New York, imparted an atmosphere of enthusiasm in the Toronto market and the golds boomed for a couple of hours in the early part of the session. The group was up 3 points in the index at the close. Other groups were down narrowly at the close.

Senior golds were taken in good volume but the buying centred in the secondary issues. Dome reached a top price of 48 1-2 and closed at 47 1-2 for a net gain of 5-8. McIntyre also dropped a point of its early gain, holding only 1-4-point and Lake Shore finished 1-2-point up. Hollinger was steady.

The copper group, trading in 9,500 shares at a price advance of 35 cents to 7.65. Only 25 cents of the gain was held. Other medium-price issues holding gains of 10 to 20 cents included O'Brien, Read-Authier, Pickle Crow, Preston Siscoe and Central Patricia. Anglo-Huronian added 30 cents.

Madsen Red Lake lost 8 cents net with 89,000 shares coming out of the heavy selling was unexplained.

Base metals weakened sharply after the announcement came out of a cut in the U. S. copper price to 11 cents. Noranda dropped 1-4 and Hudson Bay 1-4. Sherritt, Falconbridge, Sudbury Basin and Ventures were up 40 cents. Castle advanced 3 cents and Eldorado finished the day unchanged.

Winnipeg, Nov. 5—(CP)—General trade conditions throughout Canada continue to show improvement over last year, the weekly report of the Canadian Credit Men's Trust Association said today.

Eastern Canada showed advances in nearly all businesses while western Canada wholesale firms reported activity slow.

Report for Halifax and Saint John follows:

Halifax: wholesale and retail trade well maintained. Dry fish market continues dull but the Lunenburg bank catch this year is the largest for several seasons. Cotton and woolen mills are well employed.

Saint John wholesale trade continues to show improvement over last year. Retail trade is normal and collections fair.

MONTREAL, Nov. 5—(CP)—On Montreal foreign exchanges to Pound Sterling climbed 7-8 cent day to \$4.99 1-2. The French franc improved 02 cent to 3.40 cents while the United States dollar held unchanged at 3-64 discount.

NEW YORK, Nov. 5—(AP)—A sharp rise in European currencies, led by the Pound Sterling, followed a wide mark-up today in the London free market price of gold, caused by continental demand for the metal for hoarding purposes.
