Train Services Change Becomes Effective Sunday

Moncton, N. B., April 26 - As already announced a change in Canadian National passenger train services will become effective Sunday, April 30th, according to J. H. Norton, Traffic Manager of the Atlantic Region of the railway. Train leaving Moncton at 11.15 a.m. daily except Sunday will arrive Charlottetown at 3.30 p.m. instead of 6.55 p.m. Departure time from Sackville will be 1.20 p.m. instead of 1.30 p.m. Effective May 21st, the double train service daily except Sunday between the mainland and Prince Edward Island will be put into operation with a train leaving Sackville at 5.45 p.m., arriving Charlottetown 10.45 p.m. Connections will be made at Sackville with the Ocean Limited eastbound from Montreal. Additional service from Prince Edward Island will leave Charlottetown at 10.20 a.m. and Sackville 4.10 p.m. where connections will be made with the Ocean Limited eastbound for Halifax and Sydney. Other train services on Prince Edward Island will be arranged accordingly.

Madame de la Duraynte to Visit Charlottetown

The coming visit of Madame Corinne de la Duraynte, Ottawa, assistant director of the Consumer Branch, was discussed at Thursday's meeting of the Women's Regional Committee here which was presided over by Mrs. E. S. Coffin. Madame de la Duraynte is expected to visit the province May 11th and 12th. Plans were also discussed for Mrs. Coffin's West which is being observed across Canada on May 22-27. Mrs. Coffin referred to the labelling of garments a regulation adopted by the Wartime Prices and Trade Board as a precaution against degradation of quality and urged the importance of saving labels from garments purchased, along with the receipted bills, in case any complaints should be entered. Popoff Serving Two Years Term

NELSON, B.C., April 25 (CP)—Louis Popoff, self-styled "Tzar of Heaven" now serving a two-year penitentiary term for sauntering through Nelson, clad in a crown of oranges, is the latest in a series of eccentric characters who have emerged from the Doukhobor communities in Kootenay region of British Columbia. The "Tzar" about 43, first appeared in town and in his tall, powerful figure shrouded in a long grey robe and a crown of oranges gathered in a coarse net atop of his head. His pilgrimage coincided with a series of marches by members of the radical Sons of Freedom Doukhobor sect, but Popoff has denied any affiliation with this group of dissenters from the main body of the orthodox Doukhobor religion. Popoff was first arrested April 15 as he stood haranguing the crowd which surrounded a group of a dozen Doukhobors who peeped off their railing on one of the main streets of this city, where they subsequently convicted of nudity and sentenced to two years in penitentiary. The "Tzar" got off that time with a \$5 fine for obstructing traffic. He refused to take the oath on the Bible in court, saying he would rather kiss the magistrate than the book of scripture. Less than a week later, he reappeared in town and after moving all his clothing but the crown, walked through the streets to the jail where he demanded the release of his fellow Doukhobors. Far from obtaining their release, Popoff shared their fate in short order, was given the same sentence, and shunted off to penitentiary in the same train. The Doukhobors, or "Spirit Fighters," came to Canada in 1886 from Russia where their refusal to obey the man-made laws or bear arms had made them the subject of repeated persecution.
