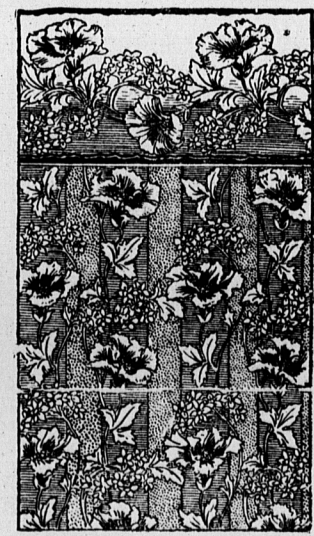

OPENING OF ST. LAWRENCE LIKELY LATE THIS YEAR

MONTREAL, March 10.—Forecasts are that there will be a late opening of navigation on the St. Lawrence this year in view of the existing conditions. The government ice breaker Lady Grey was today 35 miles below Quebec and her Captain reports ice 75 inches thick with, in addition, about 10 feet of frazil, which is unusually thick for this time of year.

Last year the St. Lawrence was opened to navigation on April 14, which was the earliest for six years.
