SHIPWRECKED CREW

Twenty-nine men of the ship wrecked crew of the "George N. Orr," arrived in Charlottetown from Savage Harbour on Wednesday night and are guests at the various hotels pending the conclusion of arrangements for their return to New York. They speak in the highest terms of the kind treatment shown them by the farmers and others.

On arrival in the City they were met by Ensign Condie of the Salvation Army who provided eight of their number not only with comfort for the winter, but clothing for their use, their boots and underclothing. The Salvation Army was in a position to temporarily accommodate these men who are grateful for the assistance rendered. One of their number Mr. Wm. Dorrity composed the following verses:

THE WRECK OF THE GEORGE N. ORR.

By One of the Survivors Dec. 8th, 1917

It was late in the fall, when we left Montreal.
For a port in the U.S.A.
We had not got a-far from the St. Lawrence Bar
Until difficulties came our way.

It was just three o'clock when we first struck a rock.
But the Captain got her seaward
Ere very, very long the wind rose in a weird song
And the weather got too leeward
There was not a single man who had any fear
Until we lost our steering gear.

So we dropped both our anchors ere 'twas too late;
Soon lost them, so waited our fate.
Then we sent up skyrockets which brought no relief
Next we knew were stuck on a reef.

So we all went to work with all might and main,
To lower a boat the shore to gain.
Bad luck intervened in that terrible squall
The blocks had got frozen to the Fall.

With hot water and coffee we got them thawed out;
The boat hit the sea with hands about;
In half-an-hour's time all the crew were safe ashore—
Some to go to sea never more.

There is one man of the crew we must give credit to
Bradley Bos'n soul of the crew
And also the mate with his hands bitten with frost,
Who tried her to save at all cost.

The shore we reached is called Prince Edward Isle
Whose people we'll recall a while,
For the hospitality shown us all around.

GRATEFUL FOR KINNESSES.—Mr. W. G. McDonald, Vernon, who was on board the train stalled at Bunnary on the night of Friday the 7th inst., and who was in the City yesterday, speaks in the highest terms of the kindness of the people of Bunnary who provided the passengers, some 75 in all, with food, fruit and other necessities and luxuries. Some of the lady passengers were kindly taken to the home of Mr. Walter Jones and driven back in the morning. Among the neighbors who rendered assistance and provided provision were Messrs. Walter Jones, Frank Boyver, Mr. Singleton and Mr. Muteh.

A QUICK TRIP.—Manager Gallagher, of the Prince Edward Theatre left Wednesday morning for Cape Tormentine to meet Mrs. Gallagher and little son who were on their way from Ottawa. They returned the same day arriving at their home in Charlottetown Wednesday evening at six o'clock. This is a new departure in railway travel between P. E. Island and the Mainland. Mr. Gallagher could have made the trip to Sackville and been back at the same evening. He reports conditions at Port Borden and Tormentine excellent, the Car ferry docking at each port in less than ten minutes. Mr. James Paton, M.L.A. made the same trip and both are convinced from what they saw of the working of the Car ferry that she is going to accomplish wonders in transportation. Nothing but a snowstorm that will block the trains can prevent daily communication with the Mainland. Mrs. Gallagher's trip from Ottawa to Cape Tormentine was not so pleasant. The trouble at Halifax and the great need of engines there has considerably affected conditions on the I. C. R. The train from Montreal was eight hours late and was obliged to drop the dinner at Quebec, which resulted in some inconvenience to the passengers. At Campbellton there was a very sad accident which resulted in the death of two train men. It appears one of them, standing by an open door, lost his balance, the other attempted to catch him and both fell overboard down an embankment. They were both dead when picked up. A sad feature of this fatality was that the wife of one of them was waiting for him at the station and knew nothing of the accident until the dead body of her husband arrived.
