COFFEE FOR CANADA ESCAPED CAPTURE. NEW YORK, Nov. 18.—Captain Estill, of the British steamer Royal Sceptre, which arrived yesterday from Santos, Brazil, described how his ship with a cargo of coffee in transit for Toronto, escaped capture by the German cruiser Karlsruhe because her destination was New York. About midnight on October 27, the captain said, in latitude 52, longitude 41.37 west, the Royal Sceptre ran near a group of four vessels and found herself the prize of the Karlsruhe. The German cruiser sent a boat alongside and an officer looked over the ship's papers. Naturally the officers of the British ship did not think that their cargo was intended for Toronto, and after convincing themselves by a study of the papers that the Royal Sceptre was bound for New York, the Germans released her. Captain Estill said that the Germans were courteous and evidently did not wish to molest a cargo they thought was for the United States. The other three vessels were the Vandeyck, which had just been captured, the two colliers to which the crew and passengers of the Vandeyck were being transferred. The boarding officer from the cruiser told Captain Estill that the crew and passengers of the Vandeyck would be sent to a nearby port, but did not reveal what port it would be. The Royal Sceptre was detained only an hour.
