—NEW ANNAN.—The death occurred at 9 o'clock Tuesday morning at her late residence in New Annan, of Mrs Alex. McNeill, at the advanced age of eighty-five years. She leaves to mourn three sons, Angus, in Lynn, Mass.; John, in Summerside, and N. J. McNeill, of New Annan; also three daughters, Maudie, in Charlottetown, and Mrs Joseph McInnis, in Boston, Mass., and Mrs John H. Bager, New Annan. The funeral takes place Thursday at 9 o'clock to Indian River Cemetery.

—WEDDING AT SUMMERSIDE.—A very pretty wedding took place in St. Paul's Church, Summerside, at 7 o'clock yesterday morning when Miss Gertrude McNeill, eldest daughter of the Hon. James A. McNeill and Mrs McNeill, was united in marriage to Mr James Hogan, chief clerk in the railway freight office. The church was beautifully decorated for the occasion. The bride was attended by her sister, Miss Pearl. The groom was supported by the bride's brother, Mr Leonard McPhail. The happy couple, after the wedding reception at the home of the bride, left by the "Empress" on a honeymoon trip to Boston and other New England states. —BOARD OF TRADE.—A special meeting of the Summerside Board of Trade was held last evening in the Agricultural building, at which there was a good attendance. The matter under discussion was the winter and winter, was thoroughly discussed. Regarding the reported discontinuance of the service by the Steam Navigation Company, as there was no definite information, this matter was laid over. Re the winter communication, which there was considerable discussion, a motion was passed naming a committee to take up the matter with Premier Mathieson, who is now in Ottawa, and a number of suggestions regarding the service were made. It was the unanimous opinion of the meeting that Summerside-Tormentine route would be the proper place for the new car ferry steamer this winter and the Committee were instructed to forward to Premier Mathieson a message urging him to represent to the different departments the desirability of having the car ferry steamer operate on this route, and also asking him to place before the department the fact that there was ancient water at all tides on this route to accommodate the steamer and that all other conditions, such as provisions, coal, etc., could be amply provided for. He was asked to use his best influence to have this matter adjusted according to the representations thus made.—C

### SUICIDE AT WELLINGTON

The body of Bruce Barlow, the well-known mill owner at Wellington, was yesterday afternoon found in his room hanging from an attic entrance. The gruesome discovery was made by the five-year-old stepson of the deceased. Coroner Jardine, of Summerside, was immediately summoned. After viewing the body and learning the circumstances he decided that an inquest was not necessary, it being a clear case of suicide. The deceased had been working about the mill during the forenoon, and no apparent cause can be assigned for the rash deed. He was 52 years of age, and leaves to mourn one daughter, of a former family, and two of the present family.
