S. S. KONGSHAIG SAILS.—The S. S. Kongsahig, Captain student, sailed early yesterday for St. Pierre, Miquelon, and St. John's, Newfoundland. Her cargo consisted of 40 head of cattle, 100 calves, 30 sheep, 600 small pigs, six tons of hay and a general cargo including butter, eggs, pork and beef.

TO INSTALL NEW EQUIPMENT.—At a cost of approximately \$50,000 with local labor being used a new steam boiler will be installed by the Maritime Electric Company in order to provide for anticipated increased consumption of electricity, officials announced yesterday. It was the intention to use Maritime coal exclusively in operation of the unit, officials said. The new boiler will operate at a pressure of 275 pounds and will have a capacity of 45,000 pounds of steam per hour. It will produce enough steam to generate approximately 2,600 kilowatts per hour—about one and a half times the maximum load at the plant during the past year which will keep the capacity of the plant ahead of the power demanded. Local workmen were also engaged for the dismantling of the old unit.
