town of Queens-own is little more than an amusement and refreshment resort for the military forces. There is an immense dry-dock on Haulbovline, employing 1,200 men, too; and the steamship companies have 14 offices here for the booking of emigrants to the United States, as well as for the convenience of tourists. About 125,000 emigrants leave here every year; and almost every day my Marquis, St. John, W. R. Mills, Guelph, Ont.; W. M. Treedy, Halifax; B. Andrews, St. John; W. A. Mackay, Toronto; P. On mails and passengers and to be a part of the correspondence relates to locating and vouching for Irish heirs to estates of Irish-Americans deceased intestate in America. I have handled three such cases already, and in one of them secured a legacy of \$6,000 American money for a County Clare farmer and his sister. Of course the consul's help is only a part of the legal procedure which must be gone through, and is partly a part of the official day's work. The tourists are not appeared as yet in any quantity; but American waifs and strays are quite prevalent, and I have had an indigent minister, a prodigal son of great ancestral lily but no cash, a stowaway out of jail and sundry other cases. I rather enjoy the variety and novelty of the new routine, which involves incessant trips up to Cork, eleven miles away, by a 25-minute railway route along the Lee. The country landscapes are lovely here, and really quite similar to those on Prince Edward Island. The fields are on an average one-fifth to one-fourth as large as those in America, and are separated by old stone walls, covered with grass and ferns to the yellow blossoms of the latter being a great addition to the ensemble. A surprisingly small proportion of the fields are cultivated, the great majority being left in grass for grazing. The cattle are small but neat and well-bred out; the Kerry cattle are elegant (sic) little black animals frequently used as ornamental cattle on the big English country estates. They are heavy milkers. The intensely green fields with cattle, sheep or goats, then are characteristic of the country side. There is a great abundance of fresh-springing streams, and the land is undulating to fully as great an extent as in the Island. The Hawthorn, holly, gorse, and innumerable wild flowers lend color and charm; and there is a wide variety of trees, although scarcely any patches of woodland. Where the land is cultivated the principal crop is of course potatoes, and these are hilled up in long flat-topped ridges quite unlike anything I have previously seen for the purpose. With a diminishing population and a scarcity of labor and enterprise the tendency is toward grazing and dairying more and more; and here the agricultural experts deplore the spread of dairying as urgently as those on the Island encourage it. I pointed out this anomaly yesterday to Mr.

Russell, of the British Board of Agriculture, with whom I had the pleasure of making the "grand tour" of the Killarney Lakes, and he attributed it to the divergence of the problems in the two communities pointing out that in Ireland the land had not for many years been cultivated to an extent sufficient to deplete the fertility of the soil, while in the Provinces the land needs the restoration of nitrogen which dairying gives.

I could write a long essay already on the so-called Irish Industrial Revival, and the efforts to build up a sentiment in favor of Irish-made goods which shall take the place of a protective customs duty system. The old Irish language is being revived, and cottage industries encouraged. The problem is closely similar to that of Prince Edward Island, although there is more manufacturing here. The whiskey, the woollens, the biscuits, and the boots and shoes are perhaps best-known, although my invoices to America include also considerable quantities of magnets, mackerel, and hides.

The ordinary vehicle here is a sort of improved jaunting-car, which is really quite comfortable as well as picturesque, and could probably be installed by some of the Charlottetown livermen or golfers with good satisfaction. The country folk use tiny donkeys with long hair, almost shaggy; and rough, springless carts. A slightly larger donkey is Spanish in origin. The plaintive cries of the melancholy creatures go to offset the blithe and ubiquitous singing of the thrushes and other songsters. The country cottages are about one-half roofed with thatched, the other half having state or tile roofs. Even corrugated iron is used. In County Limerick and County Clare the other day I saw mainly thatched, and very pretty it is, melting into the landscape as appropriately as do the old stone bridges.

We have settled down almost too easily, taking over the furnished house occupied by my predecessor, No 1 Riviera Terrace, Rushbrooke, Queenstown, about a mile and a quarter up the Lee from Queenstown, with a lovely view of the River and with gardens which at first struck me as quite elaborate but which are very ordinary compared with many around here. Housekeeping is no difficult, although there are curious oddities about it, and the range of prices averages very little higher than in Charlottetown. Neither refrigerators nor stoves are used here (except cooking stoves). The temperature figures would shock you, the summer mean in the daytime being about 65 degrees, while in the winter there is golf right through from November to May, and there has been skating only three or four times in the past half dozen years. Winter is the season for golf here, in fact, tennis being the principal summer sport for those who have not yachts or motors; and this in spite of the fact that Queenstown is some degrees farther north than Charlottetown. I have joined the Royal Cork Yacht Club, the leading club here, which is rather more available to tourists such as officers, consuls, etc., than American clubs. Also I have joined the Queenstown tennis club, and hope to get two or three evenings a week on the courts.

I fear I have given you too much detail by this time; and I have left very much unsaid. I hope to see many of my Charlottetown friends here in the course of the next few months or years, and trust that they will not regret stopping here, when abroad and letting me know of it beforehand. I have not heard anything from my acquaintances since leaving; and am wholly out of touch with the fox situation, at present, but hope I may learn something later. Will you be so kind as to give my best regards to your wife and daughter? Also to some of my other friends? I shall do more writing from this time onward. I wish I could have tried to describe Killarney, or the Shannon, or Muckross Abbey, the celebration over the third reading of the Home Rule Bill, etc.
