RECEPTION TO A NEW PASTOR

And His Wife at Murray Harbor South

The Good People of that Locality
Extend a Warm Welcome to
Rev. S. D. and Mrs. MacPhee.

The Presbyterians of Murray Harbor South recently tendered Rev. S. D. MacPhee, their new pastor, and Mrs. MacPhee, a grand reception at the palatial home of Geo. R. Montgomery. The audience was large, the delicacies provided by the ladies most appetizing, the speeches appropriate, and the music of high order. Mrs. Montgomery proved an excellent hostess. To Rev. S. D. MacPhee,
Rev. and Dear Sir: We the undersigned on behalf of the Murray Harbor section of the Presbyterian Congregation assembled here tonight, most heartily welcome you as our pastor.

When our late minister, Rev. Even Gillies, voluntarily resigned his charge, and severed his connection with this congregation, after a successful pastorate extending over eleven years, and we were left as sheep without a shepherd, we obeyed the divine injunction and "prayed the Lord of the Harvest to send a pastor to go in and out among us, and break unto us the bread of Life, giving each their portion in due season." Had it not been in accordance with the Divine Will, you also would have been prevented from coming to us. This we firmly believe, and "though hard we'd done that thou hast come," and may we all realize our position and responsibility and remember that when we assemble to hear you "we are present before God to hear all things that are commanded thee of God."

And now assembled here to greet thee we take this opportunity to pledge you our loyal support, and you may rest assured that you can always rely on our sympathy and our help, and that our prayers will ascend daily to the Throne of the Heavenly Grace for a blessing on your labors, "and while watering the souls of others, may your own soul be abundantly satisfied," "and may you see the work of the Lord prospering in your hands," "and have many souls for your hire as souls to your ministry."

It is no doubt a great source of gratification to you to see the united effort we are making to rear the superstructure of our new church edifice, and the almost superhuman effort made by the congregation as a whole to become self-sustaining, thereby taking our rightful place and status among the congregations composing the Presbytery of P. E. Island.

The unanimity that characterizes the different sections of the congregation, and the willing response made at all times

especially by the ladies, to any call upon us, or to any movement for the good of the congregation, or the cause of religion, is a great source of satisfaction and encouragement to the office-bearers and members and no doubt will prove so to you.

We also wish to extend our most hearty greetings to your amiable partner in life and extend to you both a hearty welcome to our hearts and homes, and may Heaven's choicest blessings descend on you and yours; and may you both live long and be happy in the enjoyment of the communion and fellowship of a loyal and devoted people.

MARCONI'S SYSTEM WORKS WELL

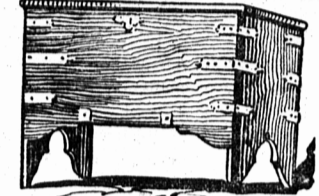
St. JOHN'S Nfld., November 13.—The Marconi wireless telegraph station at Cape Race was completed this week. The Allan line steamer Lunisian was the first ship to speak with it. The vessel remained in communication with the station nine hours and obtained news of the result of the Presidential election in the United States and other world happenings. The Canadian cruiser Minto today tested the efficiency of the station from a point of 150 miles seaward. This was one of a series of tests maintained by the Canadian government in the interests of the St. Lawrence route.

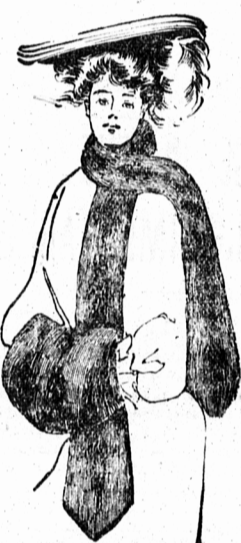
