AMERICANISING.

A writer in an English magazine deprecates the "Americanising" of Europe of the old regime, creator of the piling up of wealth, he says, is penetrating and prevailing European society to such an extent that leisure, and all that it meant for the beautifying of the world and the culture of the race, is gone. "The Europe of the old regime, creator of the countless masterpieces of architecture, sculpture and painting, the discoverer of America, she mother of science, is no more and in its place we have a hustling bustling race of men and women piling up wealth.

The idea is suggestive. Even in America are still being Americanised and the process is far from complete. Wealth is the American God which all "true Americans" worship. To be a typical American is to be wealthy, to be fit for the modern kingdom of heaven; to want this essential is to be without the pale.

"There can be no doubt," says this writer, "that, considered from our own earlier history, this idea of progress is a kind of revolutionary and destructive force. The convulsion which it has produced and is producing in Europe is not unlike that which Christianity produced in the ancient world when it destroyed the political and military spirit of Graeco-Latin civilization. And we must not forget that, from the remotest beginnings down to the French Revolution, one generation after another in Europe lived content with little, faithful to tradition, regarding every invention as a peril, every bold experiment as a revolt against God and the memory of their ancestors. The world's wealth increased from generation to generation and men multiplied and spread over the face of the earth—but how slowly, how tranquilly.

All that remains of this Europe,

American progress is now destroying with all speed. The artistic spirit is everywhere disappearing from a continent which for centuries was the prophet of beauty to the world. In past centuries the governments and the aristocracies of Europe protected the fine arts in many ways and this protection was one of the principal reasons for their progress. This is no longer true. "The wealthy classes today consider it much more dignified and elegant to manufacture automobiles and aeroplanes than to support painting and sculpture," concludes the writer.

He regards the Americanising of Europe as a fatal event. There is no power human or divine, he concludes, capable of luring this wild torrent of cupidity and ambition back to its historical font.

How much of this Americanising is going on in America? How much even in little Prince Edward Island? "The piling up of wealth is the ambition and the size of the pile is the measure of a man, and of his fitness for citizenship in the new kingdom. It is a false standard, a false conception of citizenship and a poor substitute for the old time kingdom of heaven.

But, as in the good old days when era succeeded era, when old dynasties were crowded out, and old civilizations gave place to new and more modern ones, there will be a "saving remnant," a perpetuation of the golden thread that runs through the history of the race, maintaining the indestructible instinct of humanity for the pursuit of happiness along higher levels than those of sordid wealth. Not all can even engage in the fox business or become shareholders in a gold mine. "The poor ye shall always have with you," even if it is left to the newspaper fraternity to supply the saving remnant.

A TRAGEDY.

On Tuesday night a life went out in Summerside under circumstances which necessitated a coroner's inquest. The verdict returned indicated that death was due to natural causes, heart failure and pneumonia. The jurors did not undertake to throw any light on the probable cause of the heart failure but there were circumstances which constrained them to direct the attention of the authorities to the "conduct" of the house in which this particularly sad death occurred.

Now that the authorities have had their attention called to it what will they do about it? Who are the authorities that have the power to act? The Prosecutor is the only man who can take official action. Will he do it? Has he any suspicion as to where that "three half pint bottle of whiskey" might have been procured? Has he any suspicion where the bottle came from that was found in the

room in which the man died and from which about two glasses had been taken?

Is it not time that the Prince County prosecutor had done something to dispel the current opinion that his hands are tied by parties interested in the liquor business.

Surely something will come out of this sad death which was little if any short of a tragedy. The liquor business of the province has for some time past been drifting towards such tragedy as this and, before we become as callous as we evidently are now, death, amid such surroundings as those mentioned in connection with this case, has been considered sufficiently horrible to set the community devising measures of reform.

We are drifting. There has been a slackening of the efforts of the prosecutors. Either they are becoming less active in their efforts or the liquor sellers are becoming more artful and more difficult to catch. When, in a policed town like Summerside, a gang of men can assemble in a public hotel and pass the bottle from lip to lip, when quarrelling can be heard on the street and when the noise of a man, dead or alive, falling on the floor, is not sufficiently unusual to arouse the curiosity of the inmates of the house, surely enough evidence should be available to, at least, cause an effort to be made to find out who sold the liquor.

There is liquor being sold in this province today which, doctors inform us, is rank poison and the seller of which could be held criminally responsible. The death in Summerside is not the first case of "heart failure" that has followed the drinking of this poison, some of which, we are credibly informed, is manufactured right here in the province.

Is it not time that the people had made a determined effort to find out what the prosecutor is doing? Suppose some reputable citizen handed the prosecutor the names of a few of those who are known to frequent the bar-rooms, now said to be "running full blast," and demanded that he act upon the information, is he likely to refuse? Should he refuse to act, the matter could easily be carried to the Attorney General. As the law is now being enforced it is a farce and the people who permit the farce to continue are equally guilty with the prosecutor.

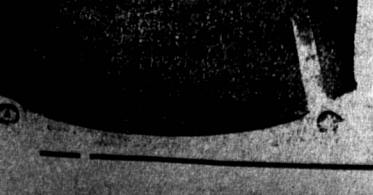
