Powder From Old South Helped at Bunker Hill

SAVANNAH, Ga., June 20.—Although the Battle of Bunker Hill, the 151st anniversary of which is today, was fought in Massachusetts and by New England folk, Georgia in the far south played an important part in it by furnishing the major portion of the all too scant supply of gunpowder.

On May 10, 1775, a special courier in this city, bringing the first news of the battle of Lexington on April 19. Some of the bold men of the colony of Georgia took immediate steps to "do their bit", even if the scene of action was a thousand or so miles away.

The colonists felt there were British to be killed and they argued they might as well be killed with their own gunpowder. A party composed of Noble Wymerly Jones, Joseph Habersham, Edward Telfair, William Gibbons, Joseph Clay, John Milledge and others whose names are indelibly written in Georgia's history, was organized. They broke into the magazine and took 600 pounds of gunpowder.

Governor Wright offered a reward of 150 pounds for the arrest of the offenders, but found no takers. The gunpowder was sent to Beaufort, S.C., for safe-keeping and was then sent on the next boat to Boston, where, in the Battle of Bunker Hill, it illuminated the opening drama of hostilities.

World Court And State Industries N. D. Issues

BISMARCK, N. D., June 19.—Whether North Dakota citizens believe the industrial program sponsored by the state has been a success and their attitude of the World Court, are the principal issues to be decided at the primary election to be held June 30.

Fighting for the Republican nomination of senator for both long and short terms are Gerald F. Nye, Cooperstown, incumbent Nonpartisan, and L. B. Hanna, Fargo. Nye was appointed by Governor A. G. Sorlie. He voted against the World Court. Hanna, a former congressman and twice governor, is a supporter of President Coolidge and the policies of the administration.

An organization known as the Independent Voters Association, a combination of Republicans and Democrats, is arrayed against the Nonpartisan League. The state bank, state flour, mill and state experimental creamery are commonwealth enterprises which this organization has charged with heavy losses. The League has attributed some of this loss to I. V. A. control and contended that the bank has nevertheless been asset.

Futurist Painting Is Recognized By Fascists

ROME, June 19.—Futurist painting has been recognized by the Fascist government as worthy of a place in the state museums. Eight works by leaders in the most advanced school of painting, including Enrico Prampolini and Fortunato Depero, were purchased for permanent exhibition at the National Gallery at Rome. They included such suggestive canvases as "War Feast," "The Distracted Pelican" and "Rhythm of Velocity."

Firpo's Concern Was Money Not Conditions

NEW YORK, June 20.—Jimmy DeForest is the real discoverer of Luis Angel Firpo, the Argentine man of mood and money.

It was in a dingy cellar in Halsey Street, Newark, N. J., that DeForest first saw the giant South American in ring togs. This was in November 1922, a few days after Firpo had debarked from a steamer bank on The Southern Cross, the ship which brought him from his native land home to New York.

The noted trainer shook his white head and sighed as he mused over the details of that discovery, the subsequent events and that hectic fight with Jack Dempsey in which the Argentine came within a whisker of the world's heavyweight title.

But Jimmy DeForest holds malice toward none. He fulfilled his contract with Firpo. He brought him within sight of his coveted goal. And never a sound of protest emerged from his lips when DeForest's strict discipline, cast him adrift for other instruction.

Love of money, was Firpo's greatest ring liability, said DeForest.

"He worried more about his end of the purse than he did about his physical condition. When Firpo was training for Willard, I established him in a camp at Allenhurst, N. J. One afternoon after a particularly irksome session in the ring with Jack McAuliffe, I told both men to go in and get some sleep.

"A short time afterward I was conducting some visitors through the camp and I asked them to step over to the barracks to see how the men slept in this Jersey air. In one of the rooms, McAuliffe was lying on his bunk, snoring loudly.

We stepped into Firpo's room expecting to see the Argentine stretched out in slumber. Instead, he was sitting on the edge of his bunk with a paper and pencil covered with figures. He was trying to figure out how much he would have left after Uncle Sam had claimed his share of Firpo's income."

DeForest tells another story illustrative for Firpo's love for the dollar.

"During the same training period a friendship developed between the big boxer and a five-year-old neighborhood girl. They were inseparable pals during the tedious weeks of my cottage and cut on the steps of my cottage and cut on the dolls for her while she snuggled up to him to pat his black hair. They took walks together, roamed the field and picked wild flowers.

"When it came time to leave, the little girl waited with the others. When Firpo appeared she started to cry and ran to him with open arms. Firpo knelt and kissed her forehead and she showered kisses on his black hair. He put his hand into his pocket, pulled out and handed her—a shiny nickel."
