Central Guardian HAS PLAN TO AID YOUTHS OF DOMINION

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) REGINA, Sask., May 9.—A "youth re-establishment corps" for thousands of unemployed youth between the ages of 17 and 22 and establishment of a trans-Canada air service steps in solution of the Canadian unemployment problem urged by C. L. Burton, president of the Robert Simpson Company, as he outlined his plan for unemployment relief in Regina today.

"We must lay plans for the future in both East and West," Mr. Burton said. "One of the measures I believe should be taken at once is the establishment of a trans-Canada air service.

"If we established this service from Halifax to Vancouver we could place thousands of unemployed youths in training schools. I believe the Dominion Government should shoulder the responsibility for organization of the service.

"We should go further," he said, "and establish new corps of young unemployed people which might be called 'youth re-establishment corps.'"

"Both this and the air force, while having no military objective, should be organized along military lines. It should be divided into companies, brigades. Members should be uniformed, should be fed and housed in camps, be disciplined the same as militia units. We could pay them possibly 50 cents per day.

"We should draft all young officers and non-commissioned men of militia rank to organize the corps."

This scheme, Mr. Burton surmised, would mean placing thousands of eager young people in healthful surroundings and under discipline which he said is now lacking in their homes.

Youths from all parts of Canada would be sent to other parts for training. A new spirit of national enterprise would spring from this intercommunication, and have a unifying effect on the air service of Canada.

The immediate advantage, he concluded, would be the removal of young people from the competition for jobs.

Central Guardian HAS PLAN TO AID YOUTHS OF DOMINION

WOULD RESTRAIN DIRECTORATE OF MOIR'S LTD.

HALIFAX, May 10.—(C.P.)—Shareholders of Moir's Limited, under a Supreme Court writ issued here today, sought an injunction restraining the newly-elected directorate from managing the company's affairs.

The directors include J. Fred Fraser, former Provincial Secretary for Nova Scotia, President J. C. McKee and General Manager W. B. Proctor, besides two other Halifax men—D. H. Turnbull and Cyril W. Stairs—and the Royal Securities Corporation.

The directors were elected at the annual meeting of March 21, at which President Frank Lewis resigned after the shareholders refused to approve his report, and four directors also retired.

ETHIOPIA PROTESTS ANEW TO ITALY

Recent Utterances By Italian Official Strongly Resented By Ethiopians.

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) ADDIS ABABA, Ethiopia, May 9.—A new controversy between Italy and Ethiopia flared today as Emperor Haile Selassie prepared to leave the capital to inspect the strategic Harrar district.

His government protested in strong language to the Italian Minister here against an address made by the Chamber of Deputies Tuesday by Alessandro Lessona, Italian under-secretary for colonies, in which he assailed Ethiopia for asserted anarchy and exploitation of subject races.

Colonies Threatened?

(Dispatches from Rome Tuesday quoted Lessona as saying Italy "desires... that her colonies in East Africa may look to the future with secure tranquility, without being preoccupied over the uncertain policy of a neighboring state which gives no guarantee of living peacefully with other nations.")

The protest filed with the minister not only expressed resentment at Lessona's speech but also referred pointedly to the Addis Ababa government's views concerning Italian territorial aims in Africa, where 100,000 Italian troops have been concentrated during recent months.

Strategic Centre

The Harrar section which the Emperor will inspect lies in southeastern Abyssinia and was for some time within the sphere of Italian influence. It is of considerable strategic importance because the capital of the province, of the same name, commands caravan and railway routes into Ethiopia.

A report that Italy had made diplomatic protests to nations furnishing arms to Ethiopia was printed in the authoritative newspaper Giornale d'Italia in Rome yesterday.

This was partly confirmed in dispatches from Brussels which said it was learned on good authority that the Italian government "in the friendliest spirit" had called Belgium's attention to arms shipments to Ethiopia.

Unemployed Demands Are Refused

(By Guardian's Special Wire) ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., May 9.—Demands by number of unemployed here were refused today at a meeting of the Commission Government of Newfoundland, which declined to recognize any committee representing unemployed and decided that control of proposed relief works must remain under jurisdiction of the Department of Public Works.

The meeting followed a gathering of unemployed yesterday outside the office of the Commission of Health and Welfare, in which a committee of five demanded that they be recognized by the government as representing the unemployed of St. John's and that they be given complete control of proposed relief work, including authority to choose the type of work. Failure to grant the demands would mean trouble, they threatened.

Seek Reward For Heroism

(By Guardian's Special Wire) ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., May 9.—Recognition of a Newfoundland seaman's heroism is being sought through the Royal Humane Society by Sir David Murray Anderson, Governor of Newfoundland.

The application is made on behalf of George P. Fortune, who, risking his life, saved Captain Elford and a mate named Woodland when the schooner R. T. McGrath was wrecked in Connaigre Bay last December. Woodland subsequently died from exposure. Only the three were on the schooner.

France Stands By The Franc

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) PARIS, May 9.—Louis Germain-Martin, Minister of Finance, declared today for a balanced budget and defence of the gold standard in the face of a steadily continuing devaluation campaign.

Faced with the problem of finding money to meet a budgetary deficit estimated at between 3,000,000,000 francs (about \$138,000,000) and 4,000,000,000 francs and to finance increased armaments needs, Germain-Martin took time off to assure the French Chamber of Commerce the government is determined to stand by the franc.

New Zealand Apples For Maritimes

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) HALIFAX, May 9.—A cargo of 27,000 cases of New Zealand apples was brought into Halifax today aboard the freighter Kumara. The consignment was one of the largest ever landed here, but the Kumara's agents, A. Jones and Company, would not say whether it was the heaviest shipment ever to reach Canada from New Zealand.

The fruit, landed at a time when the Canadian apple supply has been exhausted, will be placed in refrigeration here and released on the market gradually. It being followed by another cargo from New Zealand aboard the steamship Turakina.

Size of the Turakina's shipment was not known here.

Besides apples, the Kumara carried meat and butter, some of which may be landed here. The remainder will go on to London.

Girl Faces Death With Conspirators

(C.P.-Havas)

(By Guardian's Special Wire) HAVANA, May 9.—Gloria O'Halloran, a beautiful Irish-American girl and nine others, face possible death sentences, brought here as Cuban court-martial prepared to try them for complicity in the revolutionary plotting of Antonio Guiteras Holmes, former secretary of interior, slain in a battle with Cuban marines near Matanzas yesterday.

The prisoners, brought here and held incommunicado in grim old Cabana fortress, were captured by the government forces in El Morillo Fort, near Matanzas, where for almost three hours they resisted capture by Cuban marines in a battle in which six persons were killed and several wounded. Another woman also was captured with the revolutionaries, Mrs. Concepcion de Giaraud, wife of a noted Cuban extremist leader.

Few Deaths Result From Air Travel

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) OTTAWA, May 9.—Evidence that aviation in Canada is increasingly safe was shown today in figures compiled by the civil aviation branch of the Department of National Defence on aircraft accidents during the last three years.

The figures showed that in 1934 Canadian aircraft flew 1,497,637 miles and that in 1935, 1,571,000 miles were flown. In 1934 a total of 20 persons were killed and 13 injured while the mileage flown was a little more than 1933.

In 1933 the total number of deaths was 25, including 17 passengers and eight pilots. Thirteen persons were hurt, including five passengers. The aircraft miles flown were 1,438,315, almost 2,000,000 less than in 1934. In 1932 a total of 30 persons were killed and 13 injured while the mileage flown was a little more than 1933.
