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From Imperial Government By End Of Week And Will Be Submitted To Cabinet

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, Sept. 22.—That definite and detailed information re the naval situation, which had been asked for from the Imperial government, would be in his hands by the end of next week and that the information would be at once submitted to the Cabinet and a plan of action in connection with the navy question drawn up, which would be submitted immediately to the Canadian parliament which will be called together in November was the announcement made by Premier Borden to-night at a banquet tendered him at the Windsor Hotel to celebrate his return from Great Britain and the victory of the Party a year ago today.

HONG KONG, September 20.—A Portuguese force with machine guns today left Macao, the Portuguese dependency in China, with the object of surrounding the island of Colowan, a piratical stronghold which, on former occasions has been the scene of severe fighting. This Portuguese military move is part of an agreement between the Macao and Canton governments to employ their joint forces in the extermination of piracy now in full sway on the Canton river estuary.
