IS CANCER CONTAGIOUS

In spite of the fact that physicians and nurses have come into intimate contact with cancer patients for so many years and taken no precautions against infecting themselves there is no recorded instance of one case of cancer giving rise to another.

This is not to say that microbes are never found in cancers. Discoveries are announced from time to time that bacteria have been identified with cancer, but upon full and impartial investigation it is always found that these parasites have been invaders of the cancer growth—followers rather than producers of the malignant condition.

Cancers often become infected with such microbes as infect wounds of any kind and the unpleasant odors which are sometimes associated with cancer are due to these accidental contaminations. Consequently, the precautions to be taken by those who come in contact with cancer patients are only such as should be followed with infected wounds.

There is no occasion to shun a person who has cancer, so far as danger of contracting the disease is concerned. The victims need all the sympathy and tenderness which can be shown them. Fear that cancer was contagious has sometimes led to unnecessary and uncharitable action toward the sick.

HOGS FOR MARKET

Sir,—In your issue of Nov. 28th, I noticed a letter from Davis & Fraser in regard to thin hogs being marketed. Undoubtedly such is the case and Davis & Fraser blame the farmers for it all. But the farmer is not all to blame. He has been educated in the growing of the bacon hog and hogs that are the Yorkshire pigs are the proper material to produce the Wiltshire sides for the English market, and the longer the hog is between the ham and shoulder the more valuable the hog is. So the farmer tries to get the type of hogs that are long and tries to finish them according to the fancy of the English market, and when he has them finished he dresses them up in good shape and takes them to Davis & Fraser and puts them on the scales and the finished hog weighs two hundred pounds. Davis & Fraser say: "Your hog is too heavy we do not pay the big price only up to 160 pounds and we will cut you one cent per pound."

Now what is the poor farmer to do? Sell his pork when it is half finished for the large price or finish it and take a smaller price for the finished article? If the farmer goes to Davis & Fraser to buy hogs he tells him that ham is off a two hundred pound pig, he can have that one for a cent less per lb. than the one that weighs one hundred and sixty pounds? I guess not. Now, Sir, feed is high and if Davis & Fraser wants the farmer to produce a finished product let them put their weights for dressed hogs up to two hundred pounds and pay the same price for the one weighing one hundred and sixty pounds.

It would be some encouragement for the farmer to finish his hogs and not lose any money by weighing them forty pounds heavier; for every farmer knows it is the last hog on the lot that goes on a hog that is the cheaper to put on. But why should Davis & Fraser be entitled to that? Now I think if the packers would look at this in the attitude of the farmer, who has to bear all the blame for putting their hogs on the lot, the packer and the farmer can come to an understanding that will be profitable for both.

CHILDREN'S AID CLAIM SUPPORT

Annual Meeting Brings Unanimous Support to Appeal to Government to Give Adequate Aid in This Deserving Work.

At the Annual Meeting of the Children's Aid Society held on Monday, there was an important discussion concerning the duties of the Provincial and City Government in respect to neglected and dependent children—and the education of children in general. It was opened by the President of the Society, Hon. Dr. McMillan, and continued by the Rev. Dr. Ramsay, Rev. Mr. Muir, Mrs. McIntyre, Mrs. Hooper, Monsignor McDonald, Mr. Lloyd Shaw, Counsellors Foster and Moran, Mr. Henry Smith, Mr. Reuben McDonald and others. The President urged that common humanity requires that children shall be protected; and the fact that those who represent the community—the government of the Province, City, or State—in which children are unprotected by their parents, is in duty bound to provide means for their livelihood and education, was strongly stressed by the speakers. Such institutions as the Children's Aid Society should, it was urged, be adequately supplied by the Government, with money by means of which to perform the governments' duty. The President expressed the opinion that a Department of Public Health and Child Welfare should be established as one of the offices of the Government. He quoted a letter from the Government Director of Child Welfare in the Province of Nova Scotia to Major McNutt. In this letter it was pointed out that the Nova Scotia Act that "when children are found to be neglected within the meaning of the statute, the local municipality when they have a settlement pays \$3.00 towards the maintenance of each such child, and the Provincial Government \$2.00, or a total of \$5.00 per week for every child taken over by the Society or by me as Director." This five dollars a week it was further explained, is solely for maintenance after the child has been "taken over" by the Society, the additional expenses for investigation, etc., being met in various ways by the different Societies. For example, "practically all the Societies in Nova Scotia now receive grants directly from the municipalities; the Society in Cape Breton gets a flat grant of \$3,000 per year, which goes toward the salaries of the agents and their expenses.

At the close of the discussion, the following resolutions, moved by H. W. L. Cotton and seconded by Mrs. M. M. Murphy, was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, that the Board of Management of this Society be requested by those present at the Annual Meeting to press upon the attention of the Provincial Legislature and Government and the City Council of Charlottetown, the rights of the children of this Province and the desirability of providing means by which neglected and dependent children shall be more adequately provided for than they have been in former years."

This adoption by the Government of a reasonable policy by which neglected, dependent or delinquent children shall be cared for and educated, would without a short time cease altogether.
