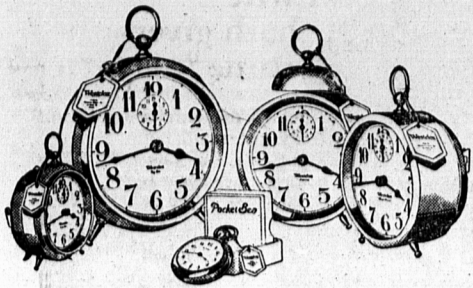

grain and other farm products by way of Vancouver.

The "great opportunity" which the Progressive Association of Saskatchewan see in the present deadlock between the two old parties is quite apparent. It is, as they think, the opportunity to force the completion of the Hudson Bay Railway immediately and saddle the Dominion with a huge addition to the national debt and a formidable increase in the annual railway deficits without regard to what it may cost. The time may come when the railway to the Bay shall be completed, but in the present state of Dominion finances immediate completion would be an act of folly. The Westerners must wait and if they are as wise as they ought to be they will not attempt a "hold-up" just now.

What they have to say about the attitude of the two old parties toward the tariff is both amusing and interesting. There is in Canada no doubt a large body of Liberal protectionists, but we had not before read or heard that they constitute a majority of the Liberal party, or that they represent the highest protectionist free of the Dominion. The Western free traders may conclude that there is little prospect of any great tariff changes upward or downward, but it is surprising to find them about equally worthy of Western support on the tariff question.

The three Prairie Provinces have just now elected 11 Conservatives, 29 Liberals and 29 Progressives. The Conservatives had 51 candidates, the Liberals 45 and the Progressives 45 in the three Provinces. The candidates who were defeated included 40 Conservatives, 25 Liberals and 25 Progressives. The tariff was apparently the main issue in the Prairie country and the Conservatives who went down to defeat there in such large numbers no doubt suffered because they advocated protection. Now the Progressives of Mackenzie say by the resolution they adopted that "the tariff question is practically disposed of for the present." If this is true there must be good hope for a large increase in the number of Conservatives to be elected in the Prairie Provinces in the coming election a few months hence.

Premier King says he has no intention of retiring from public life. But that is a question upon which the people have something to say. The electors of North Waterloo retired him at the election of 1911. North York retired him again in 1917 and again in 1925. The entire Dominion at the same time gave him a broad hint that his services are no longer required. It reports tell true the Liberal party are not unlikely to choose his successor in the party leadership before many months have elapsed.

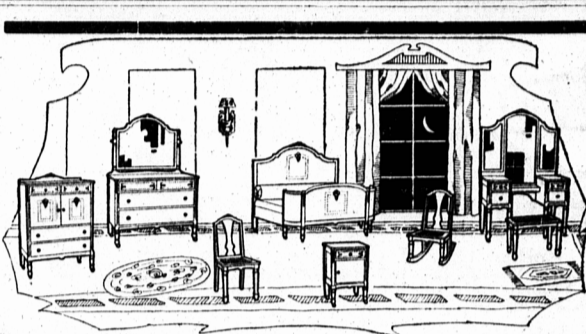
