DISARMAMENT CONFERENCE

(By Louis P. Lochner, Associated Press Staff Correspondent)

GENEVA, Feb. 9—A nine-point programme of disarmament, including a surprise endorsement of the principle of budgetary limitation on expenditures for war supplies, was presented before the Disarmament Conference today by Ambassador Hugh Gibson, acting chief of the United States delegation.

The United States spokesman shared the day's session with Chancellor Heinrich Brüning of Germany, who pledged his nation to general disarmament "of an unmistakable nature, such as the League of Nations covenant envisaged," and with Jose Carlos De Maceo Soares, Brazilian delegate and first of the representatives of the smaller powers to be heard. The demonstrative welcome accorded the Brazilian representative obviously was intended to show Latin-America that the other nations sincerely appreciated its work in the conference. Mr. Gibson made no mention of extending the present armaments truce and there was no reference to the Sino-Japanese conflict. In addition to the principal of budgetary limitation, the programme included these points:

Acceptance of the "draft convention" prepared for the consideration of the conference; prolongation of the naval agreements concluded at Washington and London; further reduction of naval armaments; total abolition of submarines; effective measures to protect civilians from bombing from the air; total abolition of lethal gases and bacteriological warfare; limitation of armed forces in the bases of effectiveness necessary for the maintenance of internal order plus some suitable contingent for defense; restrictions on tanks and heavy mobile guns.

The delegates seemed especially pleased with the United States' acceptance of the usefulness of the budgetary method of limiting armaments. This was considered a decisive step forward as the proposal was flatly rejected by the United States delegation at the meetings of the conference's preparatory commission, which prepared the "draft convention."

The delegates were unanimous in their praise of the dignified manner and the consideration of the sensible ideas of other nations with which Dr. Brüning voiced Germany's call on the rest of the world to disarm and, by indirection took issue with the thesis of M. Tardieu, who had urged the establishment of a strong military force under the direction of the League of Nations.

The German spokesman caused some surprise by not laying before the conference Germany's detailed scheme for general disarmament as drafted by her experts, but mem-

bers of the German delegation explained he had deliberately limited himself at this time to great moral issues and to pledge that Germany would support any scheme for real, not sham, disarmament.
