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Castleman Hurls Four Hit Ball As Mates Pound Cubs For 10-1 Victory

NEW YORK, May 11—While his teammates produced four home runs, their biggest four-bagger total since April 30, the Giants' Clyde Castleman produced a brand of pitching that held Chicago Cubs to four hits and gave the New Yorkers the rubber game of the series 10-1.

Johnny McCarthy led off the homer parade in the second inning after Jimmy Ripple had tripped. In the third Lou Chiozza hit one into the right field stands to score Dick Bartell, who had been hit by a pitched ball, and Joe Moore followed up with another to the same spot.

Blanton Handcuffs Bees
In Boston the Bees made only one threat when Cy Blanton, Pittsburgh Pirates, screwball flinger, hurled the league pace-setter to a 3-0 shutout and Pittsburgh lengthened their league lead to 1-2 games.

Blanton, enroute to his third triumph in four starts, had easy sailing until the fifth when the Bees loaded the bases with none out.

Blanton steadied, forced Al Lopez to foul out to Gus Suhr, who was playing his 800th game for the Pirates, and fed Baxter Jordan, pinch-hitting for pitcher Danny MacFadyen, r. double play ball.

MacFadyen, who dropped four of his five previous starts, gave the Pirates only three hits in his five innings on the mound but they were good for a pair of tallies. The Pirates' final counter came over in the ninth.

After St. Louis had knocked two Dodger pitchers out of the box and scored seven runs in three innings, their own pitching bogged down and Brooklyn came from behind to win 9-7 in Brooklyn and replace Chicago Cubs in fourth place.

Gibby Brack, with a home run, a double and a single; Johnny Cooney, with five hits, including a double, and Cookie Lavagetto, with a single and a homer, featured the 16-hit Dodger assault on four Cardinal pitchers.

Cincinnati Reds blasted three Phillies batters for 16 hits and a 12-3 victory in Philadelphia. Ivan Goodman with a home run and double led the Reds' attack, batting in three runs.
