A vote of thanks was tendered to Miss Hyde for her faithful work as Secretary of the District for the past three years. The interest manifested in the work at this convention was gratifying, and there is every hope that the schools in the district will do good work during the coming summer. It was decided to hold the next convention just after haying. The meeting closed in the usual way.
