Interest In Stocks Revives At N. Y.

(By The Associated Press)
NEW YORK, Sept. 21—Interest in stocks revived sharply last week and the market scored its first advance for a five-day period since Aug. 1.
 After an almost stagnant start Monday, when only 500,000 shares were traded on one of the lightest days on the exchange in three years, dealings picked up to 1,260,000 Wednesday for the fastest rally since late July.
 The collapse of grain prices Friday, when wheat, corn and oats at Chicago plunged the allowable daily limits, was seen as disquieting news for inflation-minded elements.

The Associated Press 60-stock composite was ahead 8 of a point on the week at 64.9. For the five sessions transactions totalling 4,180,320 shares were the largest since the week ended Aug. 1 and compared with 3,718,360 in the preceding period.
 Pivotal steels, motors and rubbers gave leadership to a smart rally Tuesday that saw 300,000 shares traded in 60 minutes and lifted the averages 5 of a point. Wednesday's average rise of 7 was the best since July 31. A wide assortment of issues climbed one to around three points, with more "bluechip" leadership. Declarations of extra and increased dividends lifted a number of special stocks.

New Threat To Stability Of U. S. Steel Prices

CLEVELAND, Sept. 21—(AP)—"The railroads' request for a 10-per-cent emergency freight-rate increase is a 'new threat to stability' of the steel price structure," the magazine Steel said today.
 "Just when it appeared the steel market had settled down to a period of relative price steadiness," the magazine Steel said today.
 "Such an increase would be reflected in higher warehouse prices and eventually in mill base prices, said the magazine. Another effect would be the stiffening of scrap deliveries, it added.

"Actually, however, higher freight cost is of relatively small consideration in light of consumers' urgency for steel," commented Steel.

Declaring that "little relief in the tight supply situation in the major products is in prospect," Steel said "last-quarter steel allotments will be further cut as a result of the loss of production in the Pittsburgh district caused by the recent wildcat strike of steel plant railroad workers."
 The national steelmaking rate advanced last week to 87.12 per cent of rated capacity, up 5.12 per cent from the previous week, with Pittsburgh operations up 24 points to 71 per cent.

Eight Senate Seats Vacant

OTTAWA, Sept. 21—(CP)—Eight Senate seats now are vacant but political observers, basing their opinions on past experience, believe that few if any of them will be filled in the near future.
 Looking over the records, observers pointed to the fact that it has become somewhat of a practice to allow Senate vacancies to accumulate until shortly before a Federal general election.
 Just prior to the 1945 general election, for instance, Prime Minister Mackenzie King appointed men to fill 19 vacancies. In 1935, the late Viscount Bennett, then Conservative prime minister, filled 18 vacancies before the general election of that year.

While Prime Minister Mackenzie King's mandate does not expire until 1950, the observers feel there is always a possibility he may go to the country within another year. With that possibility in mind, they believed Mr. King will not rush to fill the existing vacancies.

They were quick to recall, however, that it was difficult to outguess Mr. King. When Fisheries Minister Bridges died recently there was much speculation as to his possible successor. Mr. King, however, thought the Prime Minister would choose from among his followers in the Commons.

Instead, he went outside political ranks and chose Milton Gregg, V.C., president of the University of New Brunswick, as his Fisheries Minister. Mr. Gregg now is standing for election in the New Brunswick constituency of York-Sunbury made vacant by Mr. Bridges' death.
 Of the eight Senate vacancies, two are in British Columbia, two in Alberta, two in Ontario and two in Nova Scotia. The remaining seats in the 96-seat Upper House are filled by 66 Liberals and 22 Progressive Conservatives.

Some feel that when British Columbia seats are filled one might go to Veterans Minister Mackenzie who represents Vancouver Centre in the Commons. The other might go to Hon. John Hart, Liberal Premier in British Columbia.
 Among those mentioned as possible appointees to Alberta seats have been Trade Minister Mac-

Arctic Scientist Return Home



1. Few recent scientific expeditions into the Canadian Arctic have stirred so much interest as that of two young scientists, Paul H. Serson, Ottawa, and John F. Clark, Bounty, Saskatchewan, of the Dominion Observatory, Ottawa, who returned September 10 at the end of a seven week safari by R. C. A. F. amphibious Canso aircraft to report on latest position of the North Magnetic Pole. Both men are members of the staff of the Department of Mines and Resources, Surveys and Engineering Branch. With them went two geologists, Dr. Y. O. Fortier, Quebec City and Harold Stacey, Ottawa, Mines and Geology Branch. Shown here, left to right—Dr. Y. O. Fortier, Harold Stacey, Flying Officer J. F. Drake, Victoria, B.C., in command of the aircraft, Paul H. Serson, Scientist-in-charge, Dr. C. S. Beals, Dominion Astronomer at Rockcliffe airport, Ottawa, upon return of the party.
 2. "Here's the works, sir!" Scientist Serson hands down results of seven weeks of magnetic survey work in the Canadian Arctic to R. Glenn

Madill, who is in charge of planning and directing the Observatory's longrange program of magnetic research. Prosaic-looking black briefcase contains data which will mean re-drawing of magnetic charts used by aircraft, shipping, trappers, miners, prospectors, explorers—all those whose business lies in the Canadian Arctic.

3. Success of a mission, Paul H. Serson, young scientist in charge of North Magnetic Pole expedition is greeted by his Chief, Dr. C. S. Beals, Dominion Astronomer, on his return to Rockcliffe Airport, Ottawa.

4. Paul Serson makes magnetic survey at Aberdeen Lake, Northwest Territories, using instrument which he designed and helped to construct last winter for use on the expedition. Instrument is for the making of precise magnetic observations in the vicinity of the North Magnetic Pole; was successfully used where older instruments proved ineffective.
