WAR OVER BY NEW YEAR

(Continued from page one)

If the allies should be able to push the Germans on the Rhine and keep them there. Then the Russians will simply roll down to Berlin, which they hope to reach on or shortly after New Year's Day.

"Should the present German movement toward Calais succeed, which I think out of the question altogether, the Germans would be in a position even more perilous than the one they now occupy, for their lines of communication would be almost untenable."

"The sacrifice of German manhood beneath the wheels of the Kaiser's juggernaut car cannot continue indefinitely, despite the talk of a million volunteers. It is interesting to recall Field Marshall von Haseeler's comment of the Kaiser: 'His Imperial Majesty never sees the death on the battlefield.' The time must come soon, however, when the German Emperor will be forced to consider his dead."

"It seems to me, when both the number of men and amount of funds are sufficient to keep the war going, it must come to a far speedier termination than is foreseen by the average spectator at the present."

DEPENDS ON GERMAN UNITY.

Commander Carlyon Bellairs a former member of Parliament, a lecturer at the Royal Naval College and a recognized authority on warfare both on land and sea, who during a lecture tour to Canada four years ago prophesied the present conflict would start by midsummer of this year, gave the following reply to a question on the duration of the war: "The impression I have formed is based on recent history. Germany was united by the successful waging of three wars against Denmark, Austria and France, and if we succeed, as we anticipate doing, in pushing the campaign into Germany, then we have to see whether the unity of the different states of the German Empire will continue after it is faced for the first time with failure."

"For instance, Bavaria had a Constitution which even enables her to declare war separately. In fact, all the machinery is in existence which would enable smaller German states to bring about a detachment from the policy of the German Empire controlled in Prussia. An important factor in this would be the well known selfishness of Prussian Junkerdom in concentrating armies for the exclusive defence of Prussia, where are many Junker estates."

"If that unity breaks down, my impression is that the war might be over in the summer of 1915. If on the other hand the unity is maintained, we must look forward, I fear, to what now appears a long war. Just how long it is impossible to say."

ITALY IS RE-ARMING.

"Of course these considerations don't take into account the possible intervention of other powers, such as Italy, Roumania and Denmark. Italy, I understand, is re-arming her army and might be ready by the end of the year, though I have read the actual date for her complete rearmament is next spring."

"I don't believe that the German navy will play any great part in the struggle. It will remain in its ports for many months, and her state of military preparations, and at any rate, until that moment arrives, to maintain a position of watchful opportunism."

IN MEMORIAM

GEORGE MALLETT.

When George Mallett of Bradalbane P. E. I. ended his earthly life, on the morning of Aug. 24th, the people of the entire community lost a most highly esteemed resident. About 76 years ago he was born at Graham's Road, New London, where he lived most of his life, and through good management, hard work, and by the blessing of God, became a very prosperous farmer.

When a young man he was united in marriage to a Miss Davidson. There were born to them 5 sons and two daughters, a family who were blessed with the noble heritage of goodly parents' teaching and example. Many years ago the devoted wife and mother entered into rest, and one daughter and one son have since been called home to join her. The surviving members of the family are Herbert, Henry, and Mrs. Henry Burgoyne, living in P. E. I., and Joseph and Chester in Alberta. His second and surviving wife was a Mrs. Monro formerly a Miss Macdonald of Brookfield, P. E. I. She was a good helpmate for him, and faithful to the end. About 14 years ago, they moved to a new home, in a beautiful spot, a short distance from the village of Bradalbane, leaving the old homestead at Graham's Road in charge of his son Chester. Nine years ago a sweet little niece, named Grace McDonald came to live with them and was a bright little light in their home, and now mourns the loss of one who was to her a most loving father and friend. Grace is now a great help and comfort to her widowed aunt, whom, in her bereavement we commend to the God of all comfort.

Early in his life, and during a revival conducted by Rev. A. E. LePage, then pastor of Market Circuit and Rev. John Murray (Presbyterian) P. Mallett accepted Christ as his personal Saviour. He afterwards united with the Methodist Church of which he continued a most active and faithful member. He not only received Christ into his own nature, and reveal Him to the world, went out to confess Christ before men, and reveal Him to the world. He enjoyed an experimental knowledge of salvation and had courage to bear testimony to the same. Many years ago, he was instrumental in starting a Sunday School in connection with the Methodist Church at Granville, of which he was appointed superintendent. For a number of years he rendered assistance as a leader in a weekly service at Found's Mills. He will long be remembered for his faithful work as a teacher in the Sunday School, and a leader in the Sunday evening prayer and social service at Pleasant Valley, his loving interest in the children and young people, and a deep concern for their spiritual welfare, inspired him to such faithfulness.

Brother Mallett's ability to preach was recognized by the church, and he was granted a license to act in the capacity of a local preacher, which he did for many years, and with much acceptance, having always a gospel message to give, and giving it to the profit of his hearers, he was ever ready also to use his talents and influence on the side of temperance and moral reform, being frequently in demand on temperance platforms. For a long time he was an active and loyal member of the Sons of Temperance, watching for opportunities to reclaim the drunkard, or to restore a fallen member of his noble order in his official capacity he also served his church, as a member of the trustee and quarterly boards. He was the pastor's friend and a brother on whom they could depend for willing co-operation and generous support. He was worthy to be called one of the Lord's Volunteers.

For some time before his redeemed spirit passed away, our dear brother through failing health, was shut in from the services of the sanctuary, but he was patient and his faith did not falter, but the things unseen and eternal were clearer to his spiritual vision. One day, during his last illness, while conversing with an old friend, he told him that since he first came to God and had his sins pardoned, he never doubted his acceptance. But, he added, "I could not see my heavenly home just as I can now." "No," he said, "I just as plain as I can see the fields across the way." What a support it would be to our Brother in death to have such a faith and such a vision! And in such a victory over death, what a source of comfort there is for the sorrowing loved ones.
