Yankees And Indians Plan Stronger Teams

NEW YORK, Dec. 17—(AP)—New York Yankees and Cleveland Indians took steps to strengthen their lineups today when the American League champions sent outfielder Roy Cullenbine and catcher Buddy Roser to the Indians for outfielder Roy Wenerly and utility infielder Oscar Grimes.

Although the swap gives the Yankees probably the American League's fastest outfield in Joe DiMaggio, Charley Keller and Wenerly, the trading of Grimes and Roser fills weak spots on both teams. With Phil Rizzuto in the United States Navy, Red Sox coaching at Yale, Buddy Hasset, apparently headed for the armed services and Frank Crosetti under suspension for the first 30 days after the start of the 1943 season, the Yankees find themselves badly in need of infield help. Grimes has played all four positions since joining the Indians in 1938, batting .179 in 51 games last season.

The Indians, none too strong behind the plate, get an outstanding receiver in Roser, who hit at a .230 clip in 59 games last season. However, he did not see much action after falling into the bad graces of manager Joe McCarthy in July when he jumped the club. He was fined \$250 for leaving the team.

The Yanks obtained Cullenbine from Washington Senators late in August to replace Tommy Henrich when the latter enlisted in the Coast Guard. Cullenbine hit .226 for the Senators and Yanks, Cullenbine hit .276.

As for draft status of the four players the trade was a swap of two A players for two of the same classification.

Bruins Swamp Rangers 7-3

NEW YORK, Dec. 17—(AP)—Boston Bruins tonight displayed the scoring skill that has made them leaders of the National Hockey League by swamping the last-place New York Rangers, 7-3.

A crowd of 9,801 saw the Bruins hold their three-point margin at the top of the standings.

It was the fourth time in five clashes this season that the Bruins have beaten their old rivals and by far the most decisive triumph of the four. They collected their first goal less than two minutes after the opening whistle and through most of the game looked as if they could add to their score almost at will.

Lightweights Tangle Tonight

NEW YORK, Dec. 17—(AP)—There are still six more shopping days until Christmas, but Gen. J. Phelan, New York State's head Boxing Commissioner, is playing Santa Claus early this year for a couple of lucky lightweights, Tippy Larkin and Beau Jack.

When Larkin and Jack tangle in their 15-rounder in Madison Square Garden tomorrow night the General will drop the world lightweight championship into the stocking of the winner, and that's a gift slightly better than a Christmas necktie.

This is the championship recognized only in New York and probably New Jersey. To the National Boxing Association, it's just a brawl between two top-ranking lightweights, who want to settle an argument.

This is the situation that arose after Sammy Angott, abated the 135-pound Crown a few weeks ago, the N.B.A. and the New York Commission, who had no successor to Sammy would be crowned until after a national tournament, but a few days later Gen. Phelan announced the winner of tomorrow's tussle would win the championship.

Short Courses Attract Many

Eight boys and young men are taking courses here in the fundamentals of blacksmithing while in an adjoining building 4 girls are learning the mysteries of motor mechanics. The courses are being given under the Dominion-Provincial youth training plan.

Mr. F. J. Prude is instructor in the five-month blacksmithing course. The boys begin with simple operations and progress to much more complex jobs. Part of their course includes instruction in shoeing horses, one of the more difficult operations. They end up making tools, the toughest part of the trade. During the course they make sleighs and wagons under expert supervision.

Young men taking the course include: Leon Carney, Bonawil, Gerald Dolter, Brooklyn, Percy Jay and Ernest Murphy, both of Morell; Lyle McKearney, Mt. Stewart; Eric Simpson, Cavendish; and Harold Thompson, Charlottetown.

A veteran Charlottetown garage man, Mr. MacEachern, was instructing the girls in motor mechanics. His pupils complete their six-week course Saturday.

The students include: Beth Brauhaut, Murray River; Zoe Cahill, Ellidare; Margaret Campbell, Mount Stewart; Martina Dawson, Tryon; Hilda Gallant, Kingston; Helen Howatt, Tryon; Dora Jones, Emerald; Helen Kelly, Mount Stewart; Nora Kiely, Covehead Road; Catharine McEachern, Cardigan; Helen Paugh, O'Leary; Muriel Larkin and Helen Wood, both of St. Peter's.

The courses are under the supervision of minister of Agriculture, W. H. Dennis and his deputy, W. B. Shaw, who is director of Dominion-Provincial youth training in this province.

Board tuition and transportation for the students are paid by the governments. Last year more than 300 young men and women received instruction in courses which include home economics, boat-building, Agriculture, in addition to blacksmithing and motor mechanics.

Cards Outstanding Team For This Year

NEW YORK, Dec. 17—(AP)—For the 11th straight time baseball has produced the outstanding team of the year with the honor for 1942 going to St. Louis Cardinals.

Taking over the spot dominated by New York Yankees since 1932, the Cardinals rolled up 208 points in the Associated Press annual poll of the sport writers. Forty-seven of the 84 experts participating in the balloting thought the Cards' feat of overcoming Brooklyn's 10-game lead and then whipping the Yanks in the world series worthy of the No. 1 position. Thirty-four others placed the Redbirds either second or third.

Chicago Bears, winner of 24 straight games before being knocked off by Washington Redskins in the National Football League playoff last Sunday, was the only team to offer the Cards an argument and it was not very serious. The Bears, with 30 votes for first, 24 for second and 10 for third, received 148 points on the basis of three for first, two for second and one for third.

Reason the Redskins received only seven votes might be explained in the fact that most of the ballots were in place before they turned in their upset 14-6 victory.
