A merchant stated yesterday that he expected Point du Chene to be all clear of ice before the week is out and when asked on what ground he made the statement said that he judged from the several big drafts he had due this week.

Mr. Frank Bearsto, of this town, who went last month to Wetaskiwin, Alberta, has bought an interest in an agricultural implement business in that growing town and is also building a residence, on the completion of which Mrs. Bearsto and family will join him.

Mr. Alexander Waugh brought a large fat seal home with him Tuesday evening which he found floating near the shore of his farm on the north side. The seal was dead when it arrived. A bullet found in its body told that some seal hunter had aimed well but probably effectually enough.

THERE was quite a lot of straw, strewn along the lower part of Water Street yesterday afternoon, from a load attached to a run away team which started running at the east end railway crossing and finished by falling near Mr. John McDonald's livery stable.

THE Northumberland made another unsuccessful attempt to reach Point du Chene yesterday. The steamer left Summerside shortly before 9 o'clock in the morning and travelled over much the same course as on Monday and was able to get to within a short distance of Cassie's Cape and about five miles from Point du Chene wharf. Here those on the steamer heard the whistle of an engine on the I. C. R. at the Point and with the whistle of the boat salutations were exchanged with those on shore, but owing to the thick weather they could not view each other. It was found impossible owing to the large amount of heavy ice which is continually drifting down from the north to get any nearer. And then consequently the boat was turned about for Summerside and arrived there about 4 p. m. There were several passengers on board. As the wind continues to blow from the east and northeast there is no prospect of getting into the Point until there is a change.

Amendment to Prohibition

telephone and other posts with leave to sit again.

Hon. Mr. Richards as chairman of the Private Bills Committee reported upon the bill to amend the incorporation of the Charlottetown Y. M. C. A. and it was set down for second reading to-morrow.

Hon. Mr. Richards as chairman of the Private Bills Committee reported upon the Bill to incorporate the Hall Co. 243 C. M. B. A. It was set down for a second reading to-morrow.

A Bill to incorporate Empire Liqueur K. of P. of Charlottetown was given its third reading and passed.

Upon motion of Mr. Whear the House resolved itself into a committee of the whole to consider a Bill to Amend an Act respecting the Legislature. The Bill was reported agreed to with certain amendments and set down for a third reading to-morrow.

The Bill to incorporate the Trustees of the Cavendish Presbyterian Church in connection with the Presbyterian Church in Canada was read a third time and passed.

Upon motion of Mr. Rogers the House resolved itself into a committee of the whole to take into consideration a resolution to prevent the destruction of woods, forests and other property by fire. The resolution was reported agreed to and a Bill was introduced and read a first time, and set down for a second reading to-morrow.

Mr. Farquharson in moving the House into committee on the amendment to the Prohibition Bill said the proposed amendment was to make the measure doubly sure. There is no section which specially permits that residents of the other Provinces could come and purchase in P. E. Island. The Government last year placed upon the statute book a measure which a large per centage of the people wanted. He wired the other day for the decision of the Minister of Justice and a copy is now on the table of the House. The provisions of the Act wiped out the liquor traffic in the City after the 5th of June. When that day comes he wished to tell the people that no liquor shall be sold after that date. All must keep within the four corners of the Act. He considered that the liquor men of Charlottetown have had their day. They have had 12 months notice that a new order of things takes place on June 5th. If they have placed a large quantity of liquors in stock it is their own loss.

The Government expect to enforce the law with prosecutors. Every man who opens his doors will be prosecuted. He hoped the Legislature would stand together for the enforcement of the Act.

Mr. Whear said he was perfectly in accord with remarks of the Premier as to the desire of the Legislature to enforce any prohibitory measure and would willingly vote for any measure to obtain that object but since the passing of the prohibition Bill of last session circumstances have

changed. Since then the Manitoba Bill has been declared ultra vires by the full court of Manitoba. The principle of both Bills was practically the same. The Manitoba Act contained more provisions but the operative features of the Bill were the same as the P. E. Island Act. In view of this fact and that the matter will before many months be decided by the Supreme Court of Canada or the Privy Council Mr. Whear suggested that it would be advisable in the interests of the City to suspend the operation of the Act until the powers of the Province are defined. It has been contended that the Act of P. E. I. contains provisions specially prepared against the matter which the Supreme Court of Manitoba claimed to condemn in the Manitoba Bill. But such was not the case. He contended the City would be in a state of chaos for some months if an attempt is made to enforce the law without the decision of the Privy Council.

Hon. Mr. Peters explained why the proposed amendment was before the House. In regard to the decision of the Supreme Court of Manitoba he wished to say that if it is the law the temperance legislation of this Province can go to the winds. He agreed with the Premier that the people of this Province are not going to be bound by the decision of the Supreme Court of Manitoba which is not as high an authority as the Supreme Court of Prince Edward Island. He considered the decision a very able one, but the main points deal with the interference of the Act with the commerce between the province, other provinces and foreign countries. The honourable member from Charlottetown predicts trouble. The liquor men will put their hands in their pockets and subscribe to fight the Act. The Government will have to put their hands in their pockets and will have to pay for the carrying out of the Act.

Mr. Simpson said that he was heartily in sympathy with the proposed measure. While it is quite possible that the Act is sure yet it is well to make it doubly so. The electors of the Province have asked by overwhelming majorities for the prohibition of the liquor traffic. He was somewhat surprised at the attitude taken by the junior member from Charlottetown. Because the courts of Manitoba, which the Attorney General states is an inferior court to the Supreme Court at P. E. Island have condemned the Act it is no reason why the prohibition bill of P. E. Island should follow in the same way.

He dissented from the statement that prohibition was only for the City. Prohibition in Charlottetown means a great deal more, and the effect will spread throughout the entire Province. The bill does not interfere with trade and commerce outside of the Province of P. E. Island.

The House then resolved itself into a committee of the whole with Mr. Palmer, in the chair to take into consideration an amendment to the prohibition bill of P. E. I. The amendment was reported agreed to without discussion and without amendment.

The following is the amendment: While this Act is intended to prohibit and shall prohibit transactions in liquor which take place wholly within the Province of Prince Edward Island except as otherwise specially provided by this Act, and restrict the consumption of liquor within the limits of the Province of Prince Edward Island, it shall not affect and is not intended to affect bona fide transactions in liquor between a person in the Province of Prince Edward Island and a person in another Province or in a foreign country, and the provisions of this Act shall be construed accordingly.
