The last issue of the Canadian Courier, Toronto, says: "Think of it! The littlest province in Canada is about to furnish oats to the farmers of the great and golden West. It is intimated that in pursuance of its seed-grain policy, the Government may buy oats in Prince Edward Island and ship them out to Saskatchewan and Alberta. Now you could put Prince Edward Island down on the map of Saskatchewan or Alberta, and it would look like a fly on a big hand. We have talked about the golden glow of the prairie, until we have Yukons on our tongues. We have had visions of miles upon miles of box cars trailing out the glorious millions of bushels of grain from the granary of the Empire—and all that sort of thing. Probably if, fighting little island down by the Atlantic had nudged us and said, "See here, neighbor, there'll come a time when we'll send seed oats to the prairie," we should have asked him if he had ever seen a real railroad; because this little island is so tiny to look at it on the map that it seems as though a good-sized freight-train loaded with oats would have a hard time shunting without running off into the sea. But all the same the seed oats of Prince Edward Island are likely to go to the golden granary of the Empire, which makes us sit up and think that carrying coals to Newcastle may not be so much of a paradox after all. Prince Edward Island is all right. The farmers of Alberta and Saskatchewan will now be pasting maps of the island in their hats."
