Grow Impatient In Hawaiian Case

HONOLULU, Jan. 22—(AP)—Habeas Corpus proceedings to effect the release of Mrs. Granville Fortescue and three navy men, held for the murder of a suspected woman, a teacher were threatened today by their Attorneys unless prosecution authorities present the case to the grand jury Thursday.

With city and county Attorney James F. Gilliland vainly searching for an outside attorney to act as special prosecutor in the case, and delaying presentation of the matter to the grand jury on the ground that the investigation was incomplete, Montgomery Winn, an Attorney for the quartet, announced he would institute the Habeas Corpus proceedings Friday if the grand jury had not begun to act by the time.

Winn accused Gilliland of having given to the newspapers statements of two of the defendants allegedly tending to prejudice the accused in getting an impartial trial.

Proposal To Aid Ottawa Women Now Unemployed

OTTAWA Ont., Jan. 22—(By the Canadian Press)—A proposal for aiding unemployed women of the capital was before the Board of Control today. A deputation of the local council of women urged financial assistance for the purchase of materials so that many could be given work making various articles of clothing to be sold or distributed free to needy families here. It was suggested the city allocate \$5,000 for this purpose.

Many women, it was declared, who formerly held good positions, were unemployed today, and who would accept charity only as a last resort, would be willing to take sewing under such a scheme.

C., Jan. 22—(By the Canadian Press)—While Chief Constable David Murdoch, alleged slayer of a man and a woman, nervously paced his cell in the provincial jail today, a jury under the coroner R. B. White, of Pentton, at the courthouse in the same building, examined the circumstances of the shooting of Genevieve Nolan, and after 15 minutes deliberation returned a verdict that "she died of gunshot wounds received from a man wearing a blue overcoat and a grey felt hat."
