

# MARITIME BOARD OF TRADE AND MR. JUSTICE MEAGHER.

The Judge on Leaving Court House Finds the Steps Blocked by A Group Being Photographed—He Uses Language and Orders Arrest of John E. Dewolfe—Some Angry Comments—The Incident Closed.

CAPE BRETON, Aug. 20.—Mr. Justice Meagher, of the Supreme Court bench, and John E. Dewolfe of Halifax were the two most talked of men in Sydney today. After the adjournment of the Maritime Board of Trade the delegates sat on the steps of the county court building to the photograph. They packed the steps, so that Mr. Justice Meagher, accompanied by the sheriff and several barristers coming out of the room on the adjournment of the supreme court, found it impossible to come down the steps, the way being blocked. The sheriff, however, succeeded in making room for them to pass down. In going through, Mr. Justice Meagher remarked on the ill-manners of the crowd in daring to block the only entrance to the court house. These remarks were not taken very kindly by some of the board of trade delegates, who did not recognize the judge or know who he was. It was after he reached the sidewalk and had proceeded to walk away that there was a sound like hissing. The judge turned round and scolded the board of trade delegates very severely, saying they were the most ill-mannered crowd of blackguards he had ever met, and said that if the parties who hissed were pointed out to him he would immediately have them arrested.

Some of the delegates were indignant at the judge's remarks, and in the afternoon John E. Dewolfe, a delegate from Halifax, met him, when the judge was coming down from the court room. Dewolfe complained of the insult offered them by being called a crowd of blackguards and wanted to have an explanation.

## A ST. JOHN HOUSE IN HALIFAX.

E. Allan Schofield, of Schofield Bros., St. John, was in Halifax last week looking after the firm's business interests.

These will comprise cover papers, principally manufactured by the Niagara Paper Mill Co., who are recognized leaders in the making of cover papers for the Canadian market. These mills make a specialty of this line with machinery designed for the purpose, hence are able to produce a high class product. "Century Bond" and "Mic-mac Bond," two special lines handled by Schofield Bros., will also be carried in stock here in the various weights and sizes, as well as other papers in request by printers.

"I hope," said Mr. Schofield, "that the Halifax printers will appreciate this effort we are making for their convenience. Our business of late has been very satisfactory, particularly in those lines we have made a special effort to push. We are putting in the St. John office a number of extra ruling machines for the manufacture of such ruled stock as is in demand in printing offices." Schofield Bros. are selling agents for the E. B. Eddy Co.'s papers for the province of Nova Scotia, exclusive of the city of Halifax, as they are in fact for the entire territory east of Montreal.

tion. Judge Meagher said he was not to be interrupted within the precincts of the court. Mr. Dewolfe followed him out to the sidewalk, still insisting for an explanation. The judge then directed the sheriff to arrest Dewolfe and place him behind the bars. The matter, when announced at the board of trade meeting, caused a wave of indignation, and immediately a committee comprising W. M. Jarvis of St. John, C. S. Campbell of Halifax, H. Hazard of Charlottetown, and Dr. J. E. DeWitt of Wolfville, was appointed to investigate the matter and report to the meeting. The committee took legal advice in the matter, and through the good offices of a member of the Halifax bar, the incident was brought to a termination by Mr. Dewolfe being released. At the opening of the afternoon session of the board the matter was brought up for discussion, it being suggested that a committee wait upon Mr. Justice Meagher and demand an apology for his insult to the members of the board of trade.

Mr. Bentley of Truro thought they were quite within their right when they occupied a position on the steps of the court house.

Cap'n Kennelly of Louisburg regretted that Judge Meagher should so far forget himself as to address the board as he did. He thought, however, that there might be some way of overcoming the difficulty without placing the judge in any unpleasant position.

Mr. DeWolfe characterized it as a disgrace to the city of Halifax that such an insult should be offered to the delegates to this meeting and suggested the appointment of a committee of three to demand an apology, or failing in that, that a stringent resolution be passed giving the matter the widest publicity possible. He said there was hissing, but not until Judge Meagher had gone on his way and addressed them as an "ungentlemanly gathering of blackguards."

Geo. H. Dobson of North Sydney thought the matter might be dropped. (Cries of no, no, no.)

Mr. Jarvis of St. John suggested that it would be more dignified on the part of the board to let the matter drop.

Ex-Mayor Stephen felt, as a citizen of Halifax, the disgrace keenly, and said if he was to make any motion it would be to have the judge removed from the bench.

D. A. Smith of North Sydney agreed with Mr. Jarvis that the matter might be dropped.

W. S. Fisher of St. John moved that we forget all about the incident, and Dr. Black of Windsor, N. S., in seconding this motion, which passed unanimously, suggested that the members also forget the unkind and perhaps ungentlemanly words that had been said about Mr. Justice Meagher behind his back.

This closed the incident at the meeting until the announcement was made of Dewolfe's arrest, and then the committee above named was appointed.

The federal representatives for Cape Breton will bring the Meagher incident to the notice of the Dominion parliament at its forthcoming session.
