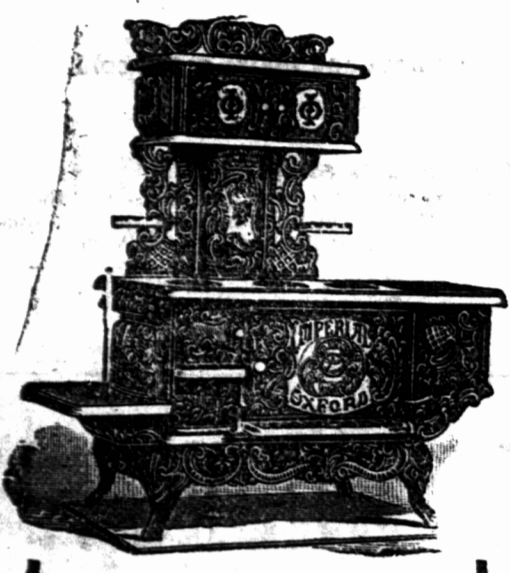
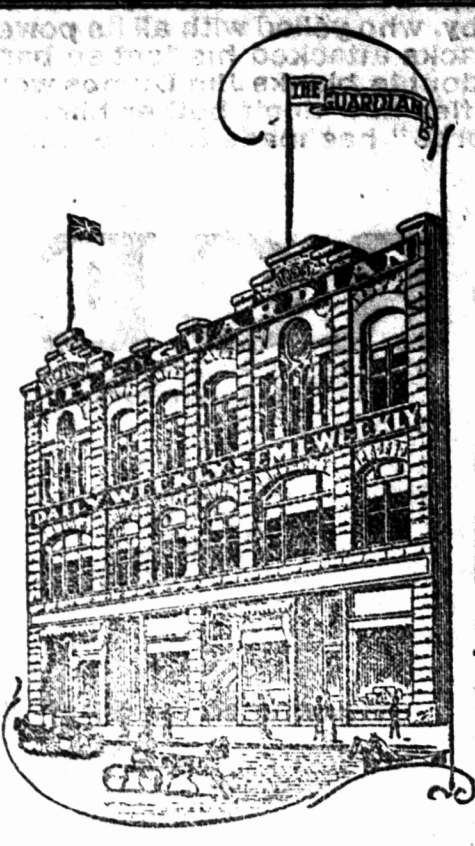

MR. KRUGER'S BIRTHDAY.
UTRECHT, Holland, Oct. 10.—The Boer generals arrived here this morning to greet Mr. Kruger, who was born on Oct. 10, 1825, on the occasion of his birthday. The whole party attended a service in church, where Mr. Kruger, assisted by his attendants, entered the pulpit and in a brief speech expressed his great appreciation of the generals' services, and begged the public to assist in relieving the distress among the Boers by freely contributing to the fund for that purpose.

On Tuesday evening G. O. Atkinson, in giving his lecture on "The Trespass Offering" described the peculiar features of each of the five offerings in the Levitical Law, pointing out their contents and similarities, and especially showing how they set forth in type various aspects of the one sacrifice of Christ. By virtue of this one perfect sacrifice the penitent believer obtains not only remission of sins and "peace with God through Our Lord Jesus Christ," but a perfect standing in righteousness before the holy God. The Trespass Offering deals with sins against God's government and against one's neighbor. The law of this requires that before the sacrifice for such trespass is offered up the wrong against the neighbor must be first righted by restoration of the full amount, adding a fifth to it. The principle of this law was alluded to by Christ in the sermon on the Mount, Matt. 5: 23, 24. The subject of the next lecture will be "The Brazen Laver."
