

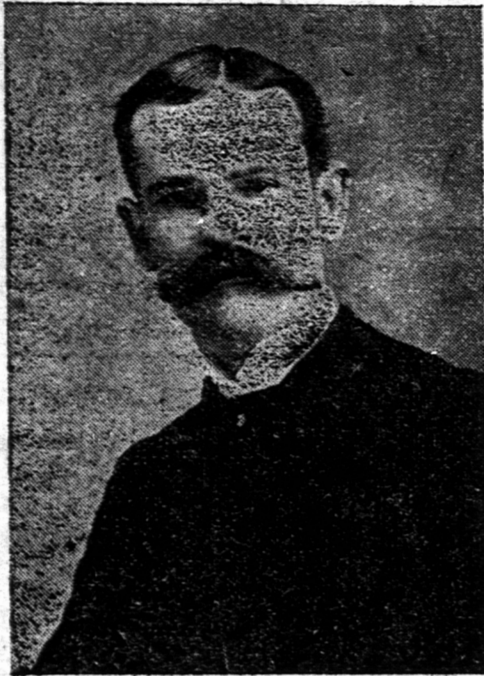
EXHIBITION CLOSSES TO-DAY

In the first heat of the free-for-all, the starters were Arc Light, (pole) Lina Bell, Warren Guy. The word go was given.

After a sort intermission the second heat of the 2:23 class was called, shortly after the start was effected Ben Hal took the lead with Dash second, Parkland third.

3RD HEAT 2:23 CLASS.

The second heat of the free-for-all was stubbornly contested and at the conclusion the spectators were in doubt whether Arc Light or Lina Bell had secured 2nd position.

THIRD HEAT 2:23 CLASS.

The third and last heat of the 2:23 class, was taken by Ben Hal who held first place throughout. At the quarter dash held second position but when nearing the half he was passed by Parkland which position was held until entering the home stretch when Parkwood broke and Dash forged ahead.

In the fifth heat Arc Light took the lead, Lina Bell second. Guy again broke on the back stretch, but soon settled down to work.

SIXTH HEAT FREE-FOR-ALL.

In the final heat Guy lead until entering the last quarter when he broke and was passed by Arc Light who was in turn passed by Lina Bell who came under the wire first.

TEACHERS, CONVENTION THE FUND

The Second Session Held in The Y. M. C. A. Hall Yesterday Morning.

MR. HILL'S ADDRESS ON LIFE OF HORACE MANN

Judge Warburton Addresses the Convention upon the Consolidation of the Schools.—Other papers read. Election of Officers will be held today after which Session Will Adjourn.

THURSDAY MORNING. Second Session.

At 9.15 Judge Warburton was introduced to the Convention to give his address on The Consolidation of Schools.

As matters now stand there is one school by every 200 of the population and the highest attendance yet attained is 60 per cent.

There are now too many subjects taught and some of them could very well be dropped. At present the aim of the public schools as at present conducted is to matriculate as large a number as possible into Prince of Wales College.

Mr. Hill was the next to give an address, his subject being the Story of a Life or the Life of Horace Mann.
