WOMAN THREW ACID IN PACKED THEATRE
ATLANTIC CITY, N.J., Sept. 28.—Five persons were burned by carbolic acid said to have been hurled by an infuriated wife, while a crowded theatre was nearly thrown into panic at the Globe Theatre late last night.
Mrs. Mollie Cantor, 36, wife of a garage owner here, and mother of four children, was arraigned today before a justice of the peace on two charges of assault and battery preferred by her husband, Henry Cantor, from whom she is said to be separated, and by Harry Kolmetzky, husband of Mrs. Harry Kolmetzky, Mrs. Cantor was released under \$500 bail in each case for the action of the grand jury.
The uproar occurred near the end of the performance of a play entitled "An Eye For An Eye," in which a jealous woman figured. Mrs. Cantor sat far up in the rear of the orchestra. Her husband and Mrs. Kolmetzky were seated in a front row, and, according to the police, Mrs. Cantor did not see Kolmetzky as the woman was seated between the two men. The police say she had previously purchased a three ounce bottle of carbolic acid at a local drug store.
Awaiting her opportunity at an intense moment of the play, the excited woman is said to have dashed down the aisle to where her husband was sitting, and to have hurled the contents of the bottle at him. The liquid sprayed in all directions, and persons nearby dashed to safety. Screams attracted the entire audience, and for a minute the place was in a state of great excitement.
A riot call was sent to the police station and a score of reserves responded. Before they arrived the management had restored order and the patrol wagon was used as an ambulance. The play was then resumed. Mrs. Kolmetzky is still in hospital. Kolmetzky Mr. and Mrs. Israel Sabots and Cantor went home after treatment.

A DANGEROUS ROAD.—In Stanchel there is a piece of road, probably thirty or forty feet in length which practically all summer has been under water. Yesterday people driving to the Exhibition were obliged to navigate this slough to which the water was from six inches to ten inches in depth. In addition to the water and mud the difficulty of navigating it is increased by sticks, fence poles and even logs thrown in by pedestrians to enable them to get over it dry shod. This is a disgrace to the province and complaints regarding it have been made to the Commissioner, but not heeded. The road machine was driven over it while in transit to another place that did not need the same kind of treatment, but did not attempt to operate. Something should be done and at once as the fall traffic is now about on. The Road Master takes an occasional drive over it, or if walking takes advantage of the fence poles, but whether he has reported it to the department is not known. There are other pieces of road in this vicinity which are equally bad and need looking after immediately.

MAY GET STEAMERS HERE
Mr. W. A. Cunningham, General Freight Agent of the Canadian Government Merchant Marine Ltd. of Montreal, was a visitor here during the past few days attending to the exhibits he has especially the live stock, which he said would compare favorably with any in Canada. While here Mr. Cunningham had several meetings with our city shippers and those from other parts of the province, also with the Potato Growers Association. We trust that the outcome of these meetings will be that a number of the Canadian Government Merchant Marine steamers will make this a port of call during the months of October and November. Mr. Cunningham is a very pleasing gentleman, and knows his business and is anxious that the province be placed in a position as far as transportation is required to reach the best markets that can be found for our surplus products. If sufficient cargo is available, steamers will call here enroute to Barbadoes, Trinidad, Demerara, Norfolk, Virginia, Long Island and ports in the United Kingdom. Steamers in all probability will also be available to carry cargoes of potatoes to Havana. Buntain, Bell Co. agents here will be pleased to give any information they can to prospective shippers.

HORSE NOTE.—In these days of the horse it is perhaps unfair to make comparisons but mention may be made of two exceptionally fine animals owned by Mr. Wallace W. McNeil of Milton, Harry T. and Mayor Todd. Mr. McNeil is a breeder of high class stock. In this connection it may be said that Mr. McNeil realized a very handsome sum for a mare, half sister of the two horses above named. This mare has already given promise of much speed.

DISCUSSES OPPORTUNITIES For Hog Marketing In Great Britain
"Island hog producers are most favoured in the matter of existing types. The large proportion of Yorkshires and Tamworth blood makes it easy for the chief change required by the newer conditions imposed by our export trade to Great Britain which is now of the highest national importance to extend greatly if possible. It is chiefly a change in the matter of weights. On the whole your hogs are far too heavy when sold for the export demand."
"The extreme limit of weight, beyond which no hog intended for overseas consumption can be classed as select is 220 lbs alive. Much in the Island, I find reach this limit in dressed form."
This expression of opinion was made yesterday to a Guardian representative by Mr. Ernest B. Roberts, of the staff of the Industrial and Development Council of Canadian Meat Packers, whose headquarters are at Toronto. He is now touring the Maritime Provinces on a special mission looking over livestock conditions.
"Two features may perhaps be emphasized for the encouragement of your hog raisers, though I ought to state that you already have the requisite types in splendid number. The first is that your hogs must be marketed much younger than at present. They should weigh between 170 and 220 lbs. alive on the farm. The second point is that you have a freight rate to large marketing centres which is strikingly favorable compared with other districts where hog raising is making a great advance and prospering the more it is extending. The rate from Charlottetown to Montreal for hogs in car load lots average \$1.33 per head. I leave you to work out how much that is per pound on a two hundred lb. hog. I am informed that by co-operative shipping it has been possible to ship to Montreal and include the expenses of a man to accompany the lot at an average cost of about one and a half cents per lb. Compare that, for instance, with the freight rates on hogs from Winnipeg to Toronto of \$2.27 per head. Toronto and Montreal packers are regularly buying hogs from points far west of Winnipeg.
"Great Britain, every year imports 600,000,000 lbs. of bacon. The total is stupendous. Yet Canada

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Must be a long-sided hog, with the lean and fat well streaked.
"But if the type and quality can be produced—and with the excellent coarse grains and the cheap potatoes that can be grown here probably no other part of Canada is so well adapted—a steady market at a good price can be guaranteed."

Curb on Prohibitionists

WASHINGTON, Sept. 28.—The Cabinet at its meetings yesterday decided to restrict prohibition enforcement operations within the three mile limit at sea except in cases where ships beyond that limit are in communication with shore through their own crews and small boats.
Prohibition enforcement officials it was said, authoritatively, would be cautioned to observe this decision.

has never seen in any one year enough bacon to supply John Bull's demand for two weeks. Denmark, a country with a population of about 3,000,000 people and whose farmers are under the necessity of importing most of their food from the United States and Canada, is expected to supply about forty percent of Great Britain's imported bacon this year. Yet Great Britain is anxious to develop inter-Empire trade; is calling out for Canadian farm products. The packing firms cannot get one-tenth of the hogs they desire of the right bacon type weight and quality for this export trade.
"Conditions in Canada are such that we could easily and with sure profit increase our bacon trade to ten times its present volume. I fancy there would be no difficulty in increasing hogs on P. E. I. farms by three times the present number. Every farm should have a brood sow. But it is no use going on blindly breeding the type that cannot be utilized for the export market. It
