MARCONI PREDICTS CHEAPER SENDING OF MESSAGES

LONDON, July 23—Another great step in the development of wireless telegraphic transmission has been realized, says Senator Marconi, who has returned to London after a two months experimental cruise in his yacht "Electra." A system has been evolved by the Italian inventor whereby wireless messages are transmitted with a minimum of electrical power, and at very low cost.

We have transmitted messages up to a distance of 2,250 miles, not only with a very smaller amount of power and energy, but faster and more cheaply than with the ordinary system of long-distance wireless," said Senator Marconi. "When the new system is adopted it will mean that a power station for long distance work can be erected at much less cost than at present. I have telegraphed on this system from Cape Verde Islands, off the African coast, to London. To send messages across 2,500 miles took less power than a message from London to Paris by the ordinary methods."

Senator Marconi explained that advantages were gained by the utilization of waves that have not before being used. Given the necessary mechanical element, he said, messages could be sent clearly seven times faster than the present rate, and that the public and the newspapers would ultimately have the benefit of much cheaper commercial charges. His opinion is that wireless is only its infancy, and that the future has in store greater marvels than have been revealed in the past.

Commenting on recent experiments conducted by American inventors looking to privacy in wireless telephonic conversation Senator Marconi said he was afraid such an achievement was still far off. "I do not say wireless telegraphy will ever be an absolutely private means of transmission, but I will say that it will be possible to make it much more difficult for anyone to get messages not intended for them."

Senator Marconi proposes to go on another experimental trip in a few week's time, and later to try the new system of long-distance wireless from the coast of the United States to Europe.

## WHO MAY VOTE

Every voter, male or female, must be 21 years of age and a British subject either by birth or naturalization.

## FOR COUNCILMAN

A voter, male or female, must own in his or her own right freehold property within the district of the value of \$325.00, and must have been in possession of the same for six months prior to June 14th, 1923. A lease holder is not entitled to a property vote.

A male voter who has served in the Great War and who has resided twelve months in the electoral district is also entitled to vote for Councilman. This privilege is not extended to women who served overseas.

A property voter, male or female, has a vote in every district in which they hold the above property qualification.

## ASSEMBLYMAN

Every person, male or female, who is 21 years of age and is a British subject has a vote if—

He or she has resided in the Province for twelve months and in the electoral district for two months prior to June 14th, or—

Who owns, or is in possession of as tenant property of the value of one hundred dollars, and has owned or been in possession of the same for six months prior to the teste of the Writ (June 14.)

A voter may vote for Assemblyman in every district wherein he or she holds a property or tenancy qualification.

## JOINT OWNERS

Where two or more persons are holding property jointly, each party will be entitled to vote either for Councilman or Assemblyman provided that his or her interest or shares of such property amounts to a value or sum sufficient to qualify him or her to vote—that is \$325.00 for Councilman or \$100.00 for Assemblyman.

A mortgagor if in actual possession may vote but not otherwise.

## STUDENTS AND FISHERMEN

Occasional absence from the Province not exceeding four months in the year, the time spent by students attending college and by mariners and fishermen in their callings is accounted as if spent within the Province or district.

## TAXES

Voters do not require to produce Poll, Road or other tax receipts. His or her vote is good whether the taxes are paid or not.
