IN MEMORIAM

JOSEPH W. PALMER
In the early morning hours of Saturday Dec 9th there passed away at the P. E. I. Hospital, Joseph W. Palmer in the 52nd year of his age. He had been in failing health for the past two years, yet the end came as a shock to his many friends. His remains were borne by motor hearse to his home in French River (by R. G. Phillips of Kensington) and lay there for two days, where in spite of stormy and inclement weather many old friends called to pay their last respects to a well beloved and respected neighbor. On Monday his body was conveyed to the historic Geddie Memorial Church where a funeral service was conducted by the Rev. Mr. Osborne who had often visited him during his illness. His favorite hymns were sung, "The Lord is My Shepherd", "A Few More Years Shall Roll", "Asleep in Jesus" and "Nearer My God to Thee." Mr. Osborne spoke feelingly—taking his text from Job 7-18 "I would not live always."
His remains were interred in the family plot beside his wife who passed away 28 years ago. The pall bearers were Samuel Bernard, Harrie Underhill, Emerson Delaney, Heath McLeod, and John Johnson and Wm. Johnson of Margate.
Mr. Palmer was the youngest of six children of the marriage of Capt. Joseph Palmer of England and Margaret McLeod, daughter of Col. John McLeod of French River. He married Eliza Jane Delaney and eight children blessed this union, five of whom survive, namely, Mrs. (Dr.) J. E. Fleming, Stanley Bridge, Mrs. J. C. Shaw, Mass. Mrs. John Leonard, Vermont, Mrs. C. P.
