Farm Notes

DAIRY HERDS SHOW PROFIT

At the Dominion Experimental Station at Lennoxville, Quebec, two dairy herds are kept—one made up of 17 head of Jerseys, the other 13 head of Shorthorns. The report of the Superintendent at this station on the performance of these herds for the year 1931 shows an average profit of \$134.27 per head for the Jerseys and \$99.43 for the Shorthorns. These figures are the profit over cost of feed average for each herd.

The herd of 17 Jerseys produced a total of 106,610.8 pounds of milk; 6,361.62 pounds of butter-fat, or an average of 5.97 per cent fat per head; a product the total value of which amounted to \$3,241.83; at a total feed cost of \$688.92; leaving a gross profit over cost of feed of \$2,282.60.

The highlights of the performance for the 13 Shorthorn dairy cattle, with a total milk production of 91,022.2 pounds averaging 4.2 per cent butter-fat giving a product the total value of which amounted to \$2,016.49 at a feed cost of \$728.86, leaving a profit over cost of feed of \$1,292.63 or an average of \$99.43.

FRUITS SUPPLY MINERALS

The greatest value of a plentiful supply of fruits and vegetables in the home lies in the minerals they supply, without which it is impossible to build sound teeth and strong bone, and enjoy general good health. The most important of these minerals are calcium, phosphorus, iron, iodine, magnesium and sodium. These, as well as most of the vitamins, are liberally supplied by fresh fruits and such vegetables as the tomato, bean, pea, and the raspberry.—Department of Agriculture, Ottawa.

GRADING HELPS EXPORTS

OTTAWA, Ont.—As a direct result of Government grading of dressed poultry, as well as the general development of poultry raising in Canada has been the recent large increase in the export of poultry, particularly to Great Britain. Four years ago Canada exported no poultry to Great Britain, and in May of this year the exports to Great Britain alone totalled 17,771 pounds as compared with 35,661 pounds in the entire fiscal year 1931. During May, 9,622 pounds were sent to Bermuda and 3,647 pounds to Newfoundland. The total export for May, 1932, was 195,987 pounds as compared with 42,083 pounds in April, 1932 and 53,051 pounds in May, 1931.—Department of Agriculture.

A DAIRY SPREAD

"A brand new dairy product—a cream testing 65 to 75 per cent butterfat, which is only 10 to 20 per cent less fat than butter. Cooled to 56 degrees this cream solidifies like butter. It is butter, as far as appearance and taste go. It is practically equal to butter in food value, is lower in cost, and you don't have to churn to get it.

"How do you get it?" you ask. One of the manufacturers of cream separators has, by designing a special cream cover and regulating cover, made this home dairy spread possible. The milk is run through the separator when first drawn; cool milk is warmed up to 100 degrees before separating.

The spread can be salted and colored, used on bread or in recipes, just like butter. The dairyman who can't buy good butter locally (or uses butter substitute because it is cheaper) and who is too busy to churn, can get quick butter from his separator by using the special parts for some of his milk. The parts cost only a few dollars"

FEED SHORTAGE CUT FAT

"A member of the cow testing association, Du Page county, Illinois, had more cows than he could feed last year, so Lionel Rieck, tester, recommended that he get rid of some. He eliminated ten and this year, with fewer cows, he had plenty of hay andilage. His monthly herd average has been from 5 to 7 pounds of fat more a cow than it was last year. At the same time the remaining cows have been maintained in better condition. This is merely another illustration of the value of cow testing association work.

City School Opening

The Charlottetown Public Schools will open at 9 o'clock Tuesday morning, September 6th.

All new pupils must be vaccinated previous to that date and present to the Principal a certificate from a Doctor stating that the vaccination was successful.

PRINCE STREET AND WEST KENT SCHOOLS. New pupils wishing to attend must go to Prince Street School if living east of Great George Street or Elm Avenue. All new pupils living on either side of Great George Street and Elm Avenue or west of that line must attend West Kent School.

The names of new pupils to attend these two Schools must be handed to the Secretary of the School Board by August 15th.

Combined Standing Fields and Threshed Grain Competition, 1932

Cash Prizes for Field of Oats, Wheat, Barley and Certified Seed Potatoes.

There will be competitions in the three counties where there are five or more entries each for Wheat, Barley, Oats and for Potatoes grown from Certified Seed.

The number of Prizes in each County will be proportionate with the number of entries. Prizes will be paid according to the combined score of the standing field and the threshed grain.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

1. A field of Oats shall consist of at least five acres, of Wheat and Barley three acres, of Certified Seed Potatoes two acres.
2. An entry fee of \$1.00 shall be charged for the first, and fifty cents for each additional entry of Grain, and \$1.00 for each entry of Potatoes.
3. The entry fee shall accompany the application.
4. Entries should be made to the Department of Agriculture not later than August 15th, 1932.
5. REGISTERED SEED ONLY. The field of Oats entered for inspection must be seeded with Registered Oats. Owing to the change in the regulations made by the Seed Branch, Ottawa, fields seeded with unregistered Oats will not be eligible for the competition.
