PRODUCE

(Canadian Press)

MONTREAL, May 19.—With increasing purchases tending to strengthen the market, daily declines in wholesale buttermilk prices came to a close today on the Montreal dairy and produce market. No 1 regraded in carlots or less continued to be quoted at 17 1/2 to 17 3/4 cents a pound. Receipts were substantially heavier, 553 boxes being offered.

The cheese market held unchanged at 10 to 10 1/4 for current Ontario colored. Week-end carryout boxes were steady to 10 1/2 cents a dozen as compared with the previous day. Arrivals were 1,712 boxes. Export sales continue light, but pressure being exerted until the market becomes larger.

With the prices of extras at 10 1/2 to 17 cents for firais at 14 1/2 to 15 cents, and for seconds at 12 1/2 to 13 cents for grades shipments in carlots or less the egg market ruled barely steady. Offerings totaled 183 boxes. No change was reported on the potato market. Prices for New Brunswick white and Prince Edward Island green mounting in 80 pound bags held at 80 to 90 cents.

How would this go for hockey players? Manager George Gibson of the Pirates baseball team does not believe in social functions for his players and says: "I fully appreciate the spirit of those who wish to honor us, but ball playing and entertaining are two different activities. We are supposed to win ball games, not to be lions at social functions, and I want my players to get all their thoughts on baseball."

The Inter-Collegiate track and field championships, which will be competed for at Cambridge, Mass., Friday and Saturday, will have an array of high grade athletes as competitors. Stanford University and the University of South California will be represented by great squads including the famous Ben Eastman, whose sensational running last year in the 400 and 800 metres in California will not soon be forgotten. Yale, Harvard, Pennsylvania and other Eastern Universities will have crack squads.

As the time draws near for the fifteen round bout between Max Schmeling and Max Baer at the Yankee Stadium, New York, June 8th, more and more people are beginning to line up behind Baer, who has done wonders in placing himself right before the fight public the past year. In that space of time he has eliminated a dozen aspirants for title honors and will enter the ring almost on even terms in the betting with the German.

Damon Runyon, one of the leading sports writers of America and considered an authority on fights and fighters, gives it as his opinion that Primo Carnera will beat Jack Sharkey in their battle, June 28th. He says Sharkey is past his peak and Carnera is coming.

The Handicap Golfers Association N. Y., have made public a plan to eliminate par as a measurement of golf skill in favor of a system of course rating. The new system now is being worked out.

Among the Californians who will compete in the Inter-Collegiate games at Harvard Stadium, is a youngster named Dunn, who has already put the shot 51 ft. 11 ins. and the discus 159 ft.

During a wrestling match at New Haven, Conn., between Joe Savoldi former Notre Dame football star, and Al Gerwicz, the time-keeper, Ed O'Brien, caught one of Savoldi's drop kicks on the nose and much claret flowed. Savoldi used football tactics by having his manager signal him during the tussle by means of playing cards.

Dr. Theodore Lewald, President of the German Olympic committee says that all athletes, regardless of race, would receive a courteous welcome in Berlin and that there will not be the slightest discrimination because of religion or race.

The Toronto Scots, champions of Canada, and the Stix, Baer and Fuller team, champions of the United States, will meet for the soccer championship of North America at Soldiers Field, Chicago, June 11th. This will be a factor of the World's Fair there.

Following Rockingham Park the next Grand Circuit meeting will be at Goshen, N. Y. where the Hambletonian Stake, the largest trotting or pacing stake in the world, will be raced for. There will be also innovations in the form of Progressive purses for trotters from the fastest to the slowest classes and the Goshen purse for pacers on the same plan. Following Goshen there will be races at Springfield, Mass., Syracuse, N. Y., Indianapolis and Hamline, Minna, and a two weeks meeting at Chicago and then on to the finals at Lexington.

The Stake entry list at Malone, N. Y. for races August 22nd to 25th, shows a surprisingly large list of entries. Here is a sample.

In the 2.10 Pace at this meeting there are over forty entries among them being J. D. Direct 2.07 3-4, raced here two years ago by Billy Keyes, and Doris Worthy 2.12, full sister to Worthy Louie 2.15 owned by Frank McKay.

The three year old trot and the three year old pace have each thirty-five entries. The thought has struck us, do they really pay for these entries as conditions said they must positively do. If so an awful lot of them are bound to be greatly disappointed as many of the horses are far below the form of others entered.

The first trotter to 2.10 up North this season was Del Hanover (3) 2.06 1-4, now a four year old, which trotted in that notch with the last quarter in thirty seconds, recently at Goshen, N. Y. for Walter Garrison.

From the American Sportsman we give some particulars regarding two minute pacing mares which will be interesting. May E. Grattan 1.59 1-4 is the leading money winner of her class and gait for in her five years campaigns she won over \$40,000 and also has the distinction of winning 45 firsts out of 51 starts. Margaret Dillon 1.58 1-4 is the joint holder of the world's record for pacing mares and paced eight seasons, being before the public longer than any other pacer of her class in the two minute list. She started 81 times in her career, winning 43 firsts and 22 seconds, a truly wonderful record. Anna Bradford's Girl 1.59 1-4 started 28 times winning 25 firsts and two seconds. Miss Harris' M. 1. 58 1-4 made 42 starts winning 24 firsts and 10 seconds. Widow Grattan 2.00 started 44 times, winning 21 firsts and 12 seconds, while Louie Grattan 2.00 started 33 times winning 17 firsts and two seconds. Widow Grattan was remarkably successful as a money winner, having totalled earnings of over \$27,000 to her credit.

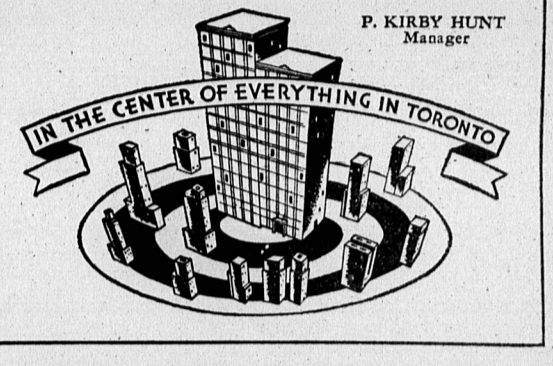

The Derby Trial, a rich event at Vienna, Austria for four year old trotters, was won by Johannes, by Adam (2) 2.07, son of Arion Guy, 1.59 1-2. Johannes is out of a daughter of Vito 2.09 1-2, which, like Arion Guy, was also a futurity winner in the U. S. A.

Summerside Driving Club have had their track prepared for spring training and quite a number of horses can be seen daily taking their work. A race meet will be held on July 1st with three or more classes, interspersed with athletic events. We hope to make an announcement shortly re their program.

While Prince Edward Island has suffered from rather cool temperature the past couple of weeks it has not prevented our horsemen from training their horses and giving them plenty of road work in addition to track work. In Ohio trainers had to quit a week ago owing to very heavy rains, which made it impossible to get out on the roads or track; so after all there are worse places than Prince Edward Island.

We have just come across the following regarding the sire of Miss Possibility, formerly owned by Jimmie Power, City, now owned by Keith Boswell, Victoria. "Possibility 2.02 3-4, made an extraordinary sparkling campaign for Sep Palm in 1914 when he secured his record and was fourteen times first and twice second in sixteen starts, having been defeated once by Napoleon Direct 1.59 3-4 and on the other occasion by Hal B. Jr. 2.02-1-2."

Keith Boswell, Victoria is proud owner of a beautiful filly, dropped on Wednesday morning by Miss Possibility 2.12 and sired by Calumnet 2.15 1-2. The little lady is in the best of health and is the centre of much interest.

Decorated Day, May 30th, will be the starter for harness racing throughout the United States. Several meetings will be held in New England states and Ohio will be agog with racing.

Earl Jr. 2.01 1-2 was the fastest record gray pacing stallion ever raced. He won 57 victories and 42 seconds in 129 starts and was only behind the money eight times in all his starts.

The leading race winner among gray stallions is believed to be Democrat 2.07 1-2, winner of 63 races in 111 starts. Earl Jr. raced thirteen consecutive years, Democrat eleven years.

Billy McVeagh has moved to the Charlottetown Driving Park track with Margaret Grattan 2.15. Dame Dillon 2.18 1-4 and three colts. Billy is of the opinion that Margaret will be good for her class this year although thirteen years of age. She is eligible to the 2.25 pace.
