As was anticipated, wool prices for 1928 were considerably higher than for the preceding year. Brokers and wool dealers anticipated the rise in market values and early in the season the local price paid to farmers rose steadily from around twenty cents to around thirty cents per pound. Graded wool sold readily during the early part of the year, netting considerably over thirty cents per pound to the producers for the best grades. As the season advanced, the buying demand eased off and it was difficult to move in large quantities until the beginning of the winter, when buying demand developed and prices strengthened. The 1928 clip was very good in quality, Western range wools being particularly low in shrinkage and bright and strong in character. The general improvement in wool prices has tended to stimulate confidence in sheep raising. Farmers are paying more attention to the health of their flocks, the culling of ewes and the use of better rams, all of which is steadily adding to the quality and saleability of Canadian wools, leading to their greater popularity on world markets and greater popularity with Canadian manufacturers. The Markets

OTTAWA, Ont., Feb. 1—Eggs—Canadian egg markets are holding firm. TORONTO.—This egg market is very firm and some dealers have advanced their buying and selling prices. B. C. offerings are firm. Poultry firm and unchanged with receipts lighter. EDMONTON—The egg market here is unchanged in tone and prices. Prices to retailers are extras 37; firsts 36; seconds 30. CALGARY.—This egg market is advancing under light receipts and floors are well cleared up of fresh stocks. A car lot from Vancouver is rolling here to meet the local demand, costing about extras 37; firsts 35; pullet extras 30, delivered. Prices to country shippers advanced to extras 30-32; firsts 28-30; seconds 20-22. Prices to retailers are extras 40-42; firsts 36-38; seconds 30-32. VANCOUVER.—The cold weather and snow here has retarded receipts and it is estimated that shipments of this week will amount to about half of last week's.
