THE TUNNEL

Sir—It seems to me that as the Car Ferry at the Cape has performed a better service than many of us anticipated, it would be a mistake to go on now to demand a tunnel, the practicability of which is, of necessity, doubtful. In fifty or a hundred years time, when our heavy National Debt shall have been materially reduced, and when our agricultural and fishing industries shall have been further developed, the tunnel may be renewed with a show of reason. In the meantime let us call upon the Federal authorities to provide a second Car Ferry adapted to the requirements of our trade and according with the recommendation of the Duncan Commission and with the conditions that have been demonstrated by "The Prince Edward Island."

FAREWELL RECEPTION

We have been speaking in none other than your own words.

You came to us as we have already said a stranger from over the seas. You have labored faithfully in our midst for upwards of five months and of late we have been brought to realize that the time you must return to college has about rolled around. Knowing that we must soon say "good bye" we felt that we could not allow you to go away without in some meagre way trying to tell you how much we have appreciated having you with us.

So much have we enjoyed your messages that we have found ourselves looking forward to the coming of the Sabbath service wondering what helpful truths you would have in store for us. Let us assure you that you through your sermons have brought to us much inspiration and comfort and we shall certainly miss you when you have gone.

And not only have we enjoyed very much the services on the Sabbath day but also in our young people's society you have added much to the interest and the helpfulness of our meetings. Our young people we can assure you will not soon forget the many words of good counsel and wisdom given to us by you in your earnest and striking manner.

But perhaps more particularly have we come to admire you and to esteem you highly as we have come to know you in your homes. As we have talked with you on the many questions of life and conduct we felt that we had a friend who understood life and who knew how to sympathize with us in all of life's affairs. Through all of our talks and discussions we felt that your great aim was to lead us ever nearer and nearer to Him who was the Great Teacher of mankind that He might thus become ever more and more the Teacher and the Guide of all men.

You have thus in various ways given such a grip of us and have so grown into our lives that we have been wondering just what we shall do when you shall have said farewell to us. But we realize that in the natural course of events these days of parting must come. In order that you might be the better fitted for the great work which you have been called of God you must complete your studies in college. This would be impossible if you were to remain with us. And now seeing that we must say "good bye" for the present we can do nothing better than to wish you all the best that life can give. But just before extending to you our best wishes and saying our little word of "good bye" we would ask you to kindly accept this small gift as a slight token of our esteem in which you are held by us. We trust that you will value this not because of its intrinsic worth but rather because of the expression of admiration and of good will conveyed by the giving of this from us to you.

And as you go out to make new friends we trust that deep down in one corner of your heart you will keep a warm spot for the many old friends in Bradalbane and the surrounding districts and should it be that in the near or in the far distant future you should decide to come and spend some time in this fair province kindly remember that a hearty welcome will be found awaiting you among the many of friends of this whole countryside.

And now farewell, may your richest blessing ever follow you. May He ever keep love's banner floating over you when life's troubles thick confound you may He then throw His loving arms around you and thus through life's darker as well as through its brighter days may He ever be with you until we meet again.

A dainty lunch was then served by the ladies which needless to say was much enjoyed by all.

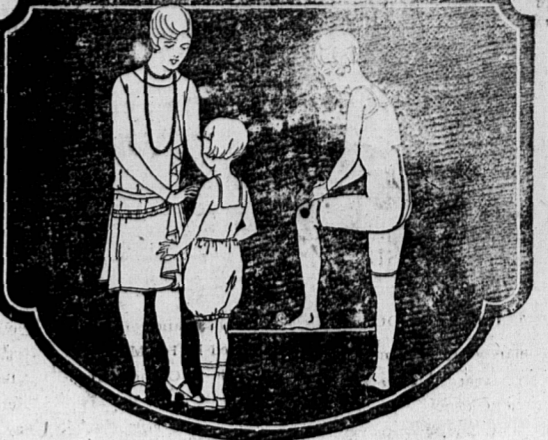
