WHEN KENTUCK LIT

Kentuck Floyd is a product of the moonshine country. He was raised among the hill billys, who when in doubt shoot first and enquire afterwards, especially with strangers or revenue people. "Some of them go into the hills but few come out," was Kentuck's curt remark Monday afternoon, while the rain was making puddles on the race track at Readville, Mass.

In 1914, this clever reinsman showed the followers of the Grand Circuit that Omar stood for more than a bunch of smokes. He won with him at Grand Rapids, Kalamazoo, Fort Erie and Saginaw, while he also grabbed a heat in 2:05 1/4 from Etawah at Columbus. Sitting on a trunk in the office at Murphy's stable, Kentuck told a few about the bumps that were handed him when he broke into the Grand at Lexington in 1909 with W. A. This horse was owned by Shipley Bros., a couple of well-to-do hillmen. After starting him a few times in Indiana, they took him home and turned him out for a couple of weeks before they decided to attack the top liners at the blue grass capital. Kentuck was selected to guide the star into the hall of fame.

In the first heat he rushed off so far in front that he had to pull him up and wait for Cox to come on with him. The favorite, he won the heat in 2:12 1/4 with W. A.'s colored groom yelling at Kentuck to let go of his horse as he had a bet on him. As the judges were of the same opinion, Kentuck had an interview on the iron stairs in front of the stand and finally won with all but two distanced in 2:10. The horse was then protested as a ringer and Kentuck fined \$50 for not trying in the first heat.

The news of the victory preceded Kentuck into the hills, where a few days after his return he saw a revenue officer coming up the road on a fine horse. The latter dismounted and while he was fastening his horse to a tree, the colored boy who took care of W. A. came along and asked the officer to give him the horse. "Why don't I do that?" said the officer, who had a couple of big guns in his belt.

"Because you will need wings in stead of a horse if you go any further," said the boy as he slipped into the bush.

The officer took the back trail. Kentuck Floyd's greatest exploit was when he played horse at Shelbyville, ran away and wrecked his Aunt Em's baby buggy. His father took him to town to see a circus. When they arrived at Aunt Em's they found that all the Floyd kin was there for dinner. Kentuck was told that he would be due at the fifth table and that in the interval he could help out by taking the baby out for an airing. Kentuck never saw a baby buggy in the hills, so he got horse fashion in between the handles and made for the middle of the street. In a few minutes he was mixed up with the circus parade with the lions and tigers roaring in the open cages, the hyena swinging their trunks. Scared half to death, he started down the main street at top speed. Daring in front of an eight horse hitch on the band wagon, he whirled into the public square. As he made the turn, one of the wheels of the buggy struck the curb and threw out the baby. The next snag was a hitching post. It crushed a couple of the wheels.

By that time all of the Floyds, long and short, fat and thin, as well as the young and old, heard of the runaway and one of them jumped on a horse and ran him down. After the capture, Kentuck's father interviewed him in the woodshed and locked him in a room, while the balance of the Floyds went to the circus.

PERSONAL INFLUENCE.

THE FORMATION OF CLOUDS

Clouds are simply a form of water made visible by the cooling of the air from which the water vapor, every cloud may be regarded as the top of an invisible warm column of current thrusting its way into a colder body of air. The comparative altitude of a cloud may be judged when there is no time or opportunity to make exact measurements from its form and outline, its shape and how it appears to move, and the length of time it remains directly illuminated after sunset. By the last method some clouds have been estimated to have been at least ten miles above the surface of the earth.

BLUE SERGE

There is no material which so perfectly displays restraint as a very dark blue serge. The color and the texture themselves suggest a world of tempting opportunities ignored. Thus there is implied an experience with, and knowledge of, infinite varieties of other hues, other clothes.

According to the need of the wearer the blue serge may be made up into coat and skirt, or into a one-piece street dress. With an exacting eye for the narrow shoulder, the close-fitting tapering sleeve, and the utmost precision of finish and cut, coupled with a resolute determination not to concede an inch to the skirt hem, one may give free scope to other lines. Once these details are observed the most fantastic sweeps of the tailor's shears may be allowed.

Blue serge is the most efficacious background for accessories of the toilette and for little finesses. Let it be the starting point for pearl gray or sand colored spats, for mourning mousquetaire's waiting gloves, for loosely over the tight, wrist, for a dark hat of concentrated lines and for a fur necklace of reduced proportions. Then, as a signature to the work of art, as well as an insinuation of what one might have done, let the veil etch a mad design in one bold, detached pattern upon the costume otherwise.

Blue serge is unassailable, impeccable. It is clever, and it is wise.

HINTS ON PAINTING

For the purpose of keeping flies and other insects away from freshly painted surface, mix a little bay oil with the oil paint or else place a small amount in an open dish nearby. The pungent odor will drive all insects away.

A very simple way to prevent or remove spots from a ceiling colored by an accidental water overflow is to take unslaked white lime, diluted with alcohol, and paint the spots with it. The alcohol will evaporate quickly and the lime will form an insulating layer that will take the size color and the spots will not show through.

To prevent the peeling of new coatings of paintings proceed as follows: Rub the surface with fine sand paper, pumice stone, wet by means of felt, then add to the paint of the first coat 1 part alcohol to 9 parts paint. This paint will dry well and give very good results, even in the most difficult cases. The remaining coatings are put on with the regular paint.

To prevent the crawling of the paint carefully rub a flannel rag over the work previous to varnishing, stripping or painting. This simple operation will prevent the crawling. In some cases crawling may be traced to defective varnish. The only remedy in this case is to obtain good varnish.

To prevent liquid paint from dripping in small quantities, from evaporating and drying place the dishes of paint one on top of the other with the underside lined with felt or very porous clay. The felt or clay should be moistened. In this manner a moist atmosphere will be produced that will prevent the paint from becoming dry and keep it from evaporating. Illustrated World.

STARTING THE LOG FIRE

The home which is fortunate enough to possess an open fireplace, in these days when the average housekeeper is interested in finding a way to corral the dollars, may be improved by the addition of a new and practical device which enables one to ignite the large, rough-hewn logs which are often so difficult to start crackling. The device consists of an attractive metal container for kerosene, made of copper brass or wrought iron, which is pitcher-like in shape and resembles the smaller variety ordinarily used for syrup, since it has a flat, attached cover similar to the type used on these logs. One side of the cover is indented to allow a handle to pass through it, to which it attached an elliptical stone, made of a special soapstone composition of a highly porous nature. This is kept in the pitcher of kerosene and is thus thoroughly saturated with oil when it is needed. It is then lighted and burns as steadily as a torch, so that when it is placed beneath the logs, it serves admirably for a glowing fagot. The amateur at fire building will find this device unusually ingenious and helpful, and it is an addition to any fireplace because of its general attractiveness.

THE SQUIRRELS SAY

"Old Joe" Arkwright as they call him up around Mineville, N. Y., came to New York yesterday, as he does each year this time and as usual brought along his "neverfail" weather forecast for the coming winter. This year according to Mr. Arkwright it's to be mild, very mild. Mr. Arkwright was at the McAlpin Hotel yesterday. He is a hunter and trapper, and he declared that the squirrels up in Essex County are storing very small hoards of nuts for the winter months, and furthermore their fur is not very long or heavy. This, he explained, is proof positive that the winter is to be mild.

"Wherever I see them storing few nuts," he said, "I know the winter will not be severe. When I see them storing quite a few nuts, but still have little hair on their backs, I shall think there's not to be much cold. But when around at this time of the year with their hair barely covering 'em, I'm fully decided we won't need much coal or wood for the fireplace." N. Y. Herald.

A SOLDIER BOTANIST IN MACEDONIA

During the occupation of Salonica by the Allies a private in the twenty-eighth division, William B. Turill, found opportunities to gather and dry wild flowers from Macedonia and to collect their seeds for Kew Gardens. Being a member of the expert staff of the establishment he had sufficient experience to carry out what must have been, in the circumstances, a fairly difficult enterprise. Macedonia has been very little explored botanically and Mr. Turill's collections form an important addition to the knowledge of its flora. One of his discoveries was a Silene which was entirely new. No less than 60 species flowered at Kew from the packets of seeds he remembered that some were secured when his unit was actually under fire. It will be seen they testify in no small degree to his devotion.
