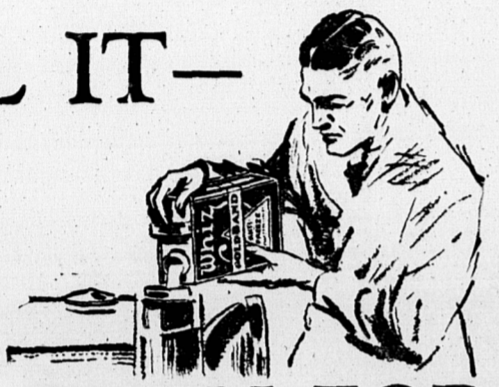

AIRPLANES USED TO CONQUER TREE PESTS

VANCOUVER, B. C., Nov. 19.—(By the Canadian Press)—Airplanes were used this summer to spray calcium arsenate and lime over a stretch of forest infested with the injurious tree pest, the Hemlock looper. So far as it has been possible to test the results of this treatment, results are promising and foresters claim the experiment may mark an important step in the eradication of forest parasites from the air.

The experiments will be continued and specially constructed equipment will be provided for the planes to be employed next year, replacing the improvised hoppers that were utilized during the past season. The fact that until recently the great Douglas fir belt has been comparatively free of damaging insects made the discovery of the Hemlock looper in the forests on the north arm of Burrard Inlet, near here, exceptionally important and alarming. Forest experts were consulted, with the result that an immediate campaign of combating the looper larvae was got under way, this taking the form of airplane dusting.

For several days planes manoeuvred over the forest spraying the screen or gas. Allowance had to be made for the atmospheric conditions and the drift of the wind so that the powder might have the maximum effect. Forest officials state that while it may take some time to determine the effect of the campaign, enough evidence of dead loopers, which are a species of caterpillars, was found to indicate success. P. E. ISLAND MINISTERIAL ASSOCIATION

The Ministerial Association met in St. Paul's Hall, city, on Monday morning last, Rev. M. Scott Fulton, President, in the chair. There was a good attendance of members and important business transacted. On the recommendation of its special committee the association assumed full responsibility for the religious supervision and pastoral oversight of the Protestant Orphanage and continues the present arrangements for the spiritual care of the Protestant inmates in other public institutions. A strong committee was appointed to deal with matters of public concern and to take action when necessary. The association agreed to meet regularly in the city of Charlottetown on the first Monday morning of each month except July, August, and September, and to make special provision for the meetings in March, June and October. It was agreed subject to the approval of the courts of the various denominational bodies represented in the association, that the executive allocate for next year its budget for the work of the Lord's Day Alliance among the various churches. The report of the Secretary-Treasurer was received and adopted. The nominating committee, through its convener Rev. H. D. Raymond, nominated the following officers for the next year: President, Rev. G. A. Grant, Winsloe; 1st Vice Pres. Rev. W. L. Out-house of Charlottetown; 2nd Vice Pres. Rev. W. R. MacWalker of North River; Secy-Treas., Rev. E. M. Alken of Cornwall. These with the ministers of the city and Major Marten of the Salvation Army constitute the executive. At 12 o'clock noon Rev. A. D. Reid, of Sydney, N. S., addressed in a very delightful and informal way the ministers and a group of lay friends on "Outstanding Arguments that I have heard in the Old Land." He spoke for about fifty minutes on prominent leaders in all the churches, whom he had heard at different times of his visits across the Atlantic and some of whom he claimed for personal friends. By a standing vote the thanks of the association were extended in a very fitting way by the chairman to the Rev. Mr. Reid who hurried away to attend a meeting of the Rotarians. The meeting adjourned shortly after 1 o'clock with the Benediction.
