COLONIAL APPEALS

Will Still Go to the Privy Council.

THE COLONIAL JUDGES

Appointed to England Must Resign—Four Sisters Burned to Death.

APPEALS TO PRIVY COUNCIL.

LONDON, Nov. 25.—(Special).—The Colonial Office has informed Australia that appeals shall continue from the Colonies to the Privy Council.

CANADA'S VIEW PREVAILS.
