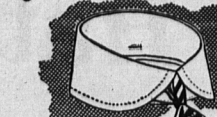

ISLAND SOLDIER TELLS OF STRENUOUS TRAINING

The following letter was received recently by Miss Evelyn Arsenault from Mr. Augustin Arsenault, son of Mr. Leon J. Arsenault, of Abram's Village, who is now in England:

Stone Farm, East Sandling, Kent, England, June 14th, 1915.

My Dear Cousin.—It is a pleasure for me to-day to write you a few lines to tell you that I am very well. Well dearie, here I am in Old England and a nice place it is. We're camped out in the country, the nearest town being 4 miles and we are 60 miles from London. We had a great trip across, 7 days and nights, on our voyage and 10 hours on the train which took us through London, and arrived at our camp at 2 o'clock in the morning; and I tell you I was pretty tired.

Well, we are only 45 miles from the firing line, and can hear the big guns going off every day. I am on going to get there, and expect we will go sometime in August. We are being drilled very severely now, putting in 10 hours a day with a pack on our back. We are also digging trenches with pick and shovel. We are many soldiers, 100 to one girl, so you see there's a slim chance for me. I am lonely here, not having gone out since we're here. But it takes up our attention to see airships flying overhead. We are all getting 6 days

leave to go visiting this place around before going to the firing line. I wish my visit could be down home. But it cannot be so I think I'll go to London and when I'm back I shall be able to write you something interesting. On looking on the roll of honor I saw the name Cosgrove from Wellington, P. E. I. No doubt you know him. Well dearie I have no more to tell you this time. Tell Father and mother not to worry about me as I'll be going back home some time. Give them all my love and remember me to Melina. Do write a long letter so it will take me a week to read it. Bye bye from your sincere friend. Have you any stamps left? Ha, ha. ANGUS.

GERMAN SOUVENIRS FOR PRINCE STREET SCHOOL

Principal J. D. Seaman of Prince Street School has received the following letter from Sergt. Ernest Weeks which speaks for itself and shows how much the efforts of the teachers of this progressive school is appreciated by the island boys at the front.

5604 Sigs. 1st Inf. Bde. Hyrs. 1st Canadian Div. 25.6.1915

Dear Mr. Seaman:—No doubt you have wondered why we have not written you before. Many times I have intended to drop you a line but each time something has turned up which has prevented me doing so.

We the Island signallers had decided long before the battle of Ypres that the only way in which we could reward and thank Prince Street school for the beautiful news from home they have been sending us from time to time, would be to send them a complete German helmet. And so it was decided that the first Islander who was fortunate enough to pick up a respectable helmet would send it along to Prince Street school.

Now although we had been in action several times as many times had picked up helmets of different shapes and forms it was not till our recent operations near Ginchy that we were able to secure this one which we have sent away to you. We were obliged to remove the spike for the reason of packing it more securely. You can easily place it on, and the chin strap will be found inside.

We have also packed several different things which may be of interest to the pupils. It is to be regretted that we could not have the helmet home in time for the school closing. But we know that you will be able to adopt some plan whereby they may all see them. Perhaps a shop window could be used to advantage.

The cartridge which we have enclosed are absolutely safe but should not be placed near excessive heat.

Reserve the above dates for your Holiday, as the Montague Race Track has a reputation of producing the best Race meet each year held in the Province and will not fall short of the mark this season.

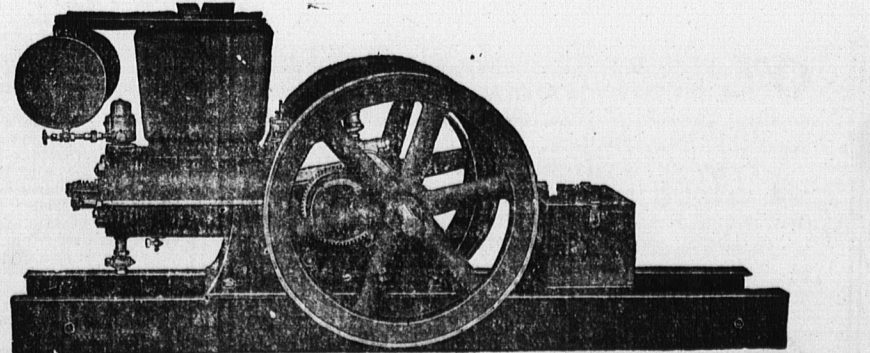
