

THE CHINESE LOAN DETERMINED.

After many weeks of diplomatic communications the announcement has been definitely made that the bankers of Great Britain, the United States, France, Germany, Russia, and Japan have agreed to lend the Chinese Government three hundred million dollars to enable it to pay of the troops employed in the late revolution, says the Toronto Globe, and to put the public finances in a sound condition. China has to submit to conditions that would be both onerous and odious to a solvent Government, but the first four out of the six powers are friendly, and they may be trusted to see that Russia and Japan get no more advantage out of the transaction than is properly coming to them. Part of the understanding finally arrived at is that political conditions and problems are by common consent left entirely out of the

international agreement. It appears quite clear from recent despatches that, while a considerable sum must be advanced at once in order to get rid of unemployed and unnecessary military contingents, which are a source of danger to the Chinese Government, the remainder of the loan will have to be dealt out by somewhat slow degrees. Many claims for payment will have to be investigated before acceptance, and much consideration will have to be given before a basis of permanent military organization can be reached. It is hardly too much to say that the slower the progress made just now under the tutelage of the friendly powers the more likely is the Chinese political organization to prove enduring. It is safe to cite this politico-financial international agreement as a potent guarantee of general peace.

A GREAT WEALTH IN EMERALDS.

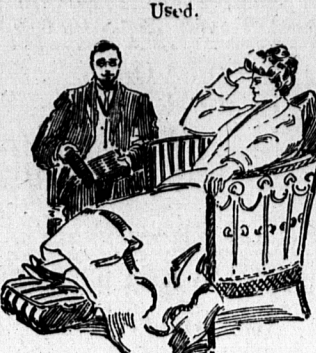
According to the news brought from Lima and Cuzco by C. R. Kehler, noted mining engineer, who has made an inspection and survey of the Andean gold belt throughout Peru, what may have been the principal source of the wealth of precious stones of the Incas at the time of the Spanish conquest has been discovered near the little town of Acomayo, in Southern Peru. Here a Greek tavern keeper by the name of Ilich Kalafatovich has discovered an emerald mine which bears evidence of having been worked by the ancient Peruvians, about one mile from Lake Pomacanchas and near the river forming the outlet for this lake. Samples of the stones sent to Lima show them to be of the finest quality. The South African Diamond Company, the London syndicate which is said to control the markets of the world in most of the precious stones, says the San Francisco Chronicle, has already obtained an option on a lease of the mine and is now negotiating with the government of Peru for its approval of the transfer of the output of the mine to the syndicate. As indicative of the wealth of the newly discovered emerald deposit the Peruvian government has taken as a

basis of the negotiations the terms by which the Colombian government leases the famous Muzco emerald mine to the same company. The royalty which the government of Colombia receives annually totals \$360,000, and it forbids that the Muzco mine be exploited for more than \$1,200,000 in any one year. Senior Manuel Zavala, Government Engineer for Peru, has made an examination of the mine, and his official report states that the emerald deposits are in a calcareous formation, in which sulphate of lime predominates and in a small basin surrounded by calcareous hills. The report also says that there exists in the old churches throughout the district and around Cuzco uncut emeralds to the value of several million soles, and the existence of an emerald mine has been a persistent tradition ever since the coming of the Spaniards. Kalafatovich, the tavern keeper, discovered the first emerald while watching his Indian workmen digging in the old excavation for material for lime. In three oblong pockets were found as many stones, one of which weighed nearly 300 carats in its rough state.

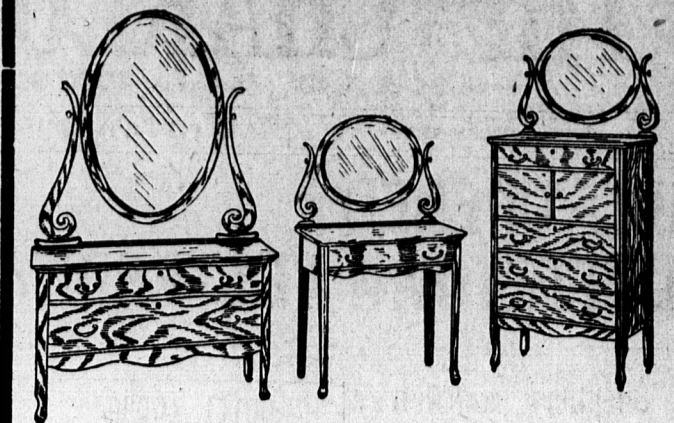

TO ERADICATE WEEDS. Sir—A number of correspondents from various parts of your province wrote this division enquiring as to the best methods of eradication of a weed, which I have reason to believe seems to be steadily increasing on some farms of the Island. The weed is a plant from 4 to 8 inches high with upright, or "kneeling" downy or nearly smooth stems, narrow, rather light green linear pointed leaves, and small creamy-white flowers. The plant belongs to the pink family, and its name is Field Mouse-ear Chickweed, (Corastium arvense L.) It is a shallow rooted perennial plant, producing many seeds, which ripen almost throughout the season after flowering is over (May-July). This is the best time to recognize the weed, which should not be allowed to spread beyond control. The weed is readily killed by the same method of spraying as practiced for Charlock. Use 2 lbs. of Sulphate of Iron to the gallon of water, and spray in spring as soon as the patches of weeds show above ground. I have the honor to be, Sir, Your obedient servant, H.T. 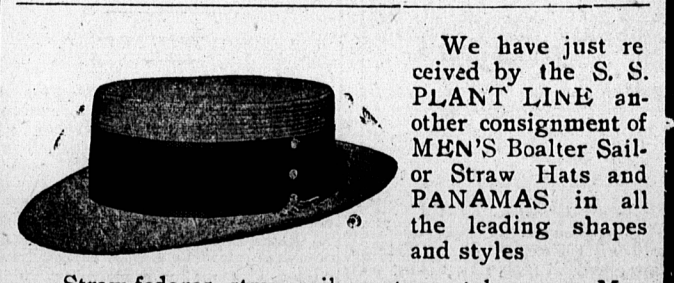
